Savannah's Corner

It has been a busy spring for the Mohave Master Gardener program. We wrapped up our annual Master Gardener Training Course in April with 17 graduates, three of whom decided to join the volunteer program and become Associates. We welcome Kingman MG Associates Doug H., Cyndi S., and Fred S. The majority of this year's Training Course participants are located in Kingman where the course was held. Next year, the course will be held in Lake Havasu, and I hope to increase the number of volunteers who sign up for the program.

Our Kingman Master Gardeners have stayed very busy maintaining the seed library at the Cooperative Extension office. After the county fair last fall, a couple of Home & Garden Shows, and a few spring workshops, our seed bank was very dry. Several Kingman MGs got together to write grant letters requesting seed donations from over a dozen companies and organizations. The responses we received were far better than expected. Between December 2021 – May 2023, we received over



3,000 seed packages! The seed bank is now fully stocked again and ready for the 2023 Mohave County Fair. Thank you to those volunteers who spent hours writing letters, repackaging seeds, and sorting seed packets.

As expected, things are already beginning to slow down for the summer. Bullhead and Lake Havasu Master Gardeners have ceased most meetings and activities until September. The number of hotline calls and emails we receive on a weekly basis has plummeted for these two areas as well. However, gardening questions for Kingman remain steady. Keep our Master Gardeners and seed bank in mind as a resource when planning your fall garden. Until then, enjoy summer and stay cool!





Bullhead City Master Gardeners

We are finally beginning our summer break in BHC and Mohave Valley. We have had a full year of meetings and presentations for the first time since the start of COVID. Our last three presentations were given by guest speakers and proved quite interesting to all who attended.

In April, we had a guest speaker, Carrie Wostal. She is an experienced Enforcement Agent for the Bureau of Land Management. Carrie had some specimens for display and discussed the plants and animals for her huge patrol area. Additionally, she discussed different laws pertaining to the BLM Management Areas, such as the illegality of digging up or removing plants from the Management Areas without official written approval from the BLM. This presentation was well received, and we have invited her back to speak again next year. (Photos 1 - 2)





Angela O'Callaghan was our May speaker and discussed Gardening in Small Spaces. A lot of interaction between her and the attendees kept everyone's attention and provided us with lots of answers to gardening problems. In June, Joe Mascarenas presented on Pest Control, a new subject to our group that was well received by attendees. Joe brought examples of tarantulas and scorpions, explaining how they could be beneficial (because they eat other insects) or pests (because they sting or bite humans). Joe, who works for a local pest control company, had the expertise and knowledge to answer all questions placed before him. The local paper covered this program with a front-page article. Our new officers were selected for the upcoming year. Bea Munoz is the new coordinator. Dennis Lesowsky will be the co-coordinator. Bonnie Muir will stay on as Secretary and Debbie and Bill as scribes. Leroy Jackson continues as treasurer and IT tech. Thanks to all for your commitment to BHC MG. Phone requests from the office for hotline assistance were minor and answered on the phone or through email. But one help call from the Mohave Community College (MCC) came in through an email to one of our Master Gardeners. They needed assistance with irrigation, pruning, and identification of the plants at the Bullhead Campus. In our meeting with the MCC staff, they suggested we use the facilities at the college and, in return, help with the landscape pruning and irrigation by using campus plants for demos during our annual programs on those subjects.

This movement to the MCC campus was agreeable to all. Starting in September, all of our meetings will be at the same time on the same days as before but at the Mohave Community College (MCC) BHC campus. This provides us with a better classroom setting with no set up and teardown as we were required to do at the BHC Library. In addition, we had to compete for the library space with other users by scheduling 90 days in advance and sometimes we were bumped for other events. We are looking forward to the new venue and all it has to offer.

The Mohave Valley Daily news has asked us to write a monthly article on gardening in this area. Each article will be written by one of our Master Gardeners with expertise in that subject. Articles will then be reviewed by the Area Assistant Agent prior to submission. As this is a new endeavor, we are not sure how it will all play out, but we are going to attempt it. On the backside, the Mohave Valley Daily news has been helping our MG events by publishing upcoming activities in their newspaper.

Bullhead area Community Garden workshops are continuing. This is an on-going project. Beginning in November of 2021, our Master Gardeners started participating in the development





of a community garden in Bullhead City. One of our Master Gardeners uses several computer programs, and his experience in scheduling and work activities, to create bar charts and plot plans for the garden layout and work activities. It is a good thing a computer-generated bar chart was used since it takes little effort to adjust the schedule from days to months and from months to years! (See photos 9 - 10)
