

Excerpts from: New Head of UA 4-H Aims to Grow Program Beyond Its Agricultural Roots

Jeremy Elliott-Engel says the "spark" that ignited him in his youth carried him through life, and ultimately culminated in a leadership position with 4-H, one of the largest youth organizations in the country.

Elliott-Engel, who once was a 4-H member in rural upstate New York, is now the new associate director for 4-H youth development at UA Cooperative Extension. He began in September.



"There's a lot of literature around 'youth spark' and having young people identify the thing that they're interested in, and helping facilitate that interest," Elliott-Engel said. "When the 4-H model is conducted with high context and high content, it is very powerful in helping young people build efficacy around their spark. We want to help young people find that spark, and help them develop mastery."

Elliott-Engel said he hopes to take Arizona 4-H beyond agriculture, the industry that has been part of the organization's identity since it began at the beginning of the 20th century with a motto of "head, heart, hands and health." "The current zeitgeist is that 4-H is centered on agriculture. And that's certainly the organization's roots and a current strength. But that doesn't mean that that is all 4-H is. We want to help translate research happening at the UA to a youth audience," he said.

Elliott-Engel said he looks forward to leading Arizona 4-H and engaging units across campus.

"We want to be the youth development program that people from across the UA campus turn to when they think about doing youth outreach," he said. "When other departments want to do youth work, we hope they would think about 4-H as their delivery mode."

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Over 6,000 youth across Arizona were enrolled in the 4-H club program in 2017-18.

4-H Pillars Around the Arizona Community

ealthy Living: Since the beginning of 4-H in 1902, communities of 4-H members and leaders have been called on to help with natural disasters and emergencies. Arizona 4-H recently became part of the MyPi grant program (sponsored by a grant from NIFA and EDEN) to develop a National Youth

Preparedness Initiative. Recently Arizona professionals and staff participated in a 3 day Train the Trainer program which prepares them to train other community members to respond to local disasters.

TEM: A little over a year ago, the University of Arizona 4-H Program received a grant from the Agnes Haury Program to develop a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) program that would involve students from two Native American Tribes, Tohono O'odam and Pascua Yaqui. There are several partners in this grant including Plma Community College, the University of Arizona, and Arizona 4-H. Twenty-eight teachers from five schools were trained

and 1500 students participate in programs on the college campuses and after-school 4-H Programs. The Program is going very well and these members also had exhibits at the Pima County Fair.

griculture: Arizona 4-H has several remarkable programs which promote Ag Literacy with Arizona school children each year. These programs involve thousands of 4-H participants each year who take part in a variety of activities designed to help them recognize the importance of agriculture in their daily lives and the economy of Arizona. Here is one example: The AgVentures program at the Maricopa Agriculture Center was developed in 1998. It is partially funded by grants from long time supporter,

Mary Faul. Each year over 3500 youth visit the farm and learn about farming, food production, healthy living and environmental stewardship.

ivic Engagement: This past year, Arizona 4-H had members attend both Leadership Washington Focus and Leadership Washinton Focus. Eight youth leaders from Yuma county and two chaperones (Coconino & Cochise County) attended Citizenship Washington Focus. Two civic youth leaders and their chaperone (all from Greenlee County) attended Leadership Washington Focus this past July in Washinton D.C. We are excited to support youth leaders in pursuing their dreams to grow and learn more in 4-H.

We humbly ask for your support in continuing to fund Arizona 4-H programs for generations to come. Please read the opportunities below to see where support is still needed.


ore than 100,000 Arizona 4-H members and youth contacts are developing caring relationships, learning leadership and life skills, and providing service to others, and their communities. The skills learned through 4-H help young people become competent, caring, and contributing citizens. Increased financial support is necessary to maintain and enhance the quality of the educational programs for which 4-H is known. You can make a difference by contributing to Arizona 4-H through the Arizona 4-H Youth Foundation, which has been granted 501(c)(3) non-profit status by the Internal Revenue Service.

Funds are needed to support several areas:

- 1. **Recognition**—Funds are needed to support recognition programs for 4-H Leaders and Members. This includes development of the State 4-H Hall of Fame for leaders, supporters and professionals, support of nominees for national recognition, Salute to Excellence, National 4-H Hall of Fame, and Youth of the Year.
- 2. Leadership Development—Providing project-related training for volunteers, organizational leadership, training for youth and adult leaders is a cornerstone of 4-H. As our program reaches out to new audiences, there will be more opportunities to provide training.
- 3. **Program Enhancements**—4-H teens have been asking for more opportunities to learn through statewide activities and events. Sponsorships from businesses can make these opportunities more cost effective.
- 4. Endowment Programs—Endowments can be established to support specific projects, county 4-H programs, and the Arizona 4-H Program in general.

5. **Scholarships**—Scholarships currently support 4-H graduates attending colleges and/or trade schools. Scholarships can also be created to support 4-H members attending State and National 4-H Events.

You can donate to Arizona 4-H in a variety of ways, including current gifts such as cash, property, corporate matching and securities, or planned gifts such as life insurance, wills/bequests, memorials, and charitable trusts/ annuities.
