The Natural Resource Users Law and Policy Center, in conjunction with Cooperative extension at the University of Arizona, offers a spring hybrid in person and online internship. This internship is a unique chance for students interested in agriculture, mining, forestry, and state and federal policy.

Interns will have the opportunity to engage and be placed with a natural resource industry political organization for the semester on several fronts, including policy, communications, and membership, and will work closely with the lobbying and regulatory teams on policy important to natural resource industries. The student will gain a broader understanding of the political landscape regarding natural resources in Arizona.

Up to three college credit hours will be offered through the University of Arizona. Students must work with their academic advisor to sign up for credit hours for the Spring Semester. Personal transportation will be needed for travel to and from Phoenix for organizational and legislative activity.

The Natural Resource Users Law and Policy Center is a creative partnership of the University of Arizona Cooperative Extension and the James E. Rogers College of Law.

Expectations:

- Students will attend two in person meetings at the beginning of the semester with the NRULPC Intern Cohort.
- Students will interact weekly with their assigned organization, either virtually or in person as needed.
- Students will produce at least 2 Bill Analysis papers and one written policy related article over the semester
- Students will come back together in person at the end of the semester for a final meeting to share learned experiences from internship.
- All dates to be determined between internship coordinator, Taylor Bowen, and selected interns.
