




4-H EDIBLE SCIENCE CLUBS

AG-VENTURES W/VICTOR JIMENEZ

Have you ever been at a crossroads and not quite sure what to do? In the beginning of 2000 Victor Jimenez found himself in this predicament. He had been re-assigned from the Maricopa County Extension office to the Maricopa Agricultural Center in Maricopa. There was already a traditional 4-H extension agent in the county offering 4-H programming, so he knew whatever he was going to do, it would have to be different. That's when he came up with the idea of having school students visit MAC Farms and he would teach them about Ag Literacy with fun, hands on learning.


Victor decided he would teach them at different stations in the multi-purpose room and out on the grass. He would ask all his colleagues at MAC to help him also. He could have someone teach about water, one teaches about entomology, one to teach about soil, and another to teach about general agriculture. He reached out to schools all over Pinal County to see who would come. When Victor reported his idea to the University, he suggested that he would be able to reach 650 students (he was hoping). He would call his idea Ag-Ventures, an idea borrowed from a similar program back east.

After his first year, Victor tallied up all the kids that he had reached and discovered that 1200 students had visited the farm! He had almost doubled what he thought was possible. The director of MAC Farms, Bob Roth, was very supportive of Victor's new venture. He would have meetings in the multi-purpose room and start talking about all the Ag-Venture things that were now cluttering the room. The community was starting to get excited about this great opportunity for the students of Pinal County.

The second year Victor ran out of money. How was he supposed to continue this great opportunity without any money? Well, he started charging everyone that attended \$1. This helped cover some of the operating expenses so that he could continue. Then donors started to see what a great thing Ag-Ventures was and started helping Victor out with some expenses. Soon he outgrew the multi-purpose room, and they purchased some old Army surplus buildings to become the start of the Ag-Village as classrooms. They are still there today! There are several classrooms, a 4-H museum, restrooms, and a kitchen. Slowly everything that you see today came along. Before Covid, 3000 students a year were visiting Ag-Venture. From the year 2000 until now Victor estimates that 60,000 students have visited the farm and learned while having fun.

Agriculture is such a big topic that there is never a shortage of topics to learn at the farm. Some of Victor's favorite ag-literacy topics to teach are about water, nutrition, fruits and veggies, plant science, the history of agriculture, gardens, the water cycle, and dams. He has curriculum tailored for each grade, K-6. Ag-Ventures has expanded past Pinal County into Maricopa County and beyond. They even take Ag-Ventures on the road to the classrooms that are too far to come on a bus! Besides school students, they have even hosted adult programs called Desert Ag-Ventures. 

Remember it is called fishing and not catching. My favorite member from my dad, is when he caught more, I was not holding my mouth right.

CATTLE SORTING—ROWDY WILSON, COUNTRY KICKERS 4-H CLUB HISTORIAN

Cattle Sorting is also called Ranch sorting, originating from cowboys and cowgirls working on ranches. These cowboys and cowgirls used to separate cattle into different pens for branding and doctoring. Cows were also separated to be sold. The sorting of cattle was later turned into an equestrian sport. I recently started learning the sport of sorting cattle with my 4-H club and my twin sister. My twin sister Sonny tried it first and said it was fun, so I decided to try it.





The sorting pen is two big pens that are connected on one side, and there is an opening where they are connected. The sorting pen I started learning in is like a big figure 8 with an opening where they connect. I have also competed at a sorting event where the pens were square but had the same center opening. Two riders make up the team. There are normally 10 cows numbered 0 to 9. Sometimes, there is an extra cow with no number, and that cow is called the trash cow and should never pass through the opening. One rider guards the opening to ensure only the desired cow passes through the opening, and the sorted cows do not sneak back over to the herd. The second rider approaches the herd and separates a specific numbered cow.

The sorting team has 60 seconds to get all numbered cows from one side of the pen to the other, in numerical order. The timer starts when the rider's horse crosses the opening, and the announcer calls out the starting number. If the wrong cow crosses through the gate, the team gets a no time. The team that gets the most cows sorted in the least amount of time wins.



The best part of sorting with 4-H is I have met many people. The people at the 4-H sorting events are so nice and don't get angry when someone messes up.

Rowdy's opinion of Sorting: *I really like sorting cattle because it is more fun than turning circles around cans.*

Sonny's opinion of Sorting: I really like sorting cattle because I have made friends and my horse Sangria likes it too.

SEWING PROJECT



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SHOWING LIVESTOCK—WHAT TO EXPECT!



The Pinal County fair is just around the corner. Are you ready? If you have a 4-H large livestock project, it should already be entered into the Jr. Livestock site. Don't forget to read the rules and information about the shows. All other 4-H small stock entries can be entered online in ShoWorks, once those dates (entry and deadlines) are released. Don't forget to read up on the requirements outlined in the 4-H Exhibitor Book, which can be found at https://extension.arizona.edu/pinal-county-fair

PASSES

Now that you and your animal are entered online, you can think about how to prepare for the entire week of fair! Are you staying at the fairgrounds? If it is possible, it is truly recommended. It's lots of fun and saves on super early and late-night driving. Get information about this overnight stay as soon as you know, as there are a limited number of spots available. If you do decide to stay, make sure you get a camping pass from your community club leader. This will give you 1 parking pass and one adult week-long pass. Don't forget to count how many family members will be there all week. If they will attend fair more than 2 times that week, it is worth buying a week-long pass for each and one. And who can go to the fair without thinking about those rides? Are the kids going to ride the rides one day or more? You can save if you get a ride bracelet ahead of time, that allows all the rides for one day. Passes will be ordered and paid for through your community club leader. Also remember that if you are a certified 4-H leader, you will receive one FREE week-long pass. And, if your child is showing an animal in the Jr. Livestock Show, they will also receive a week-long pass. Additional passes will need to be purchased.

PACKING

Let's talk about packing – for your family AND your animal! It will feel like you are moving to the fairgrounds, because you are (for a whole week)! Let's start with the family. Always pack water. Take more water than you think you will drink. If possible, have your kids carry personal water bottles and fill them up from the cooler in your trailer; this keeps from leaving plastic water bottles all over the place. If you are driving every day, ask a friend with a trailer if you could store your cooler with water under or near it. Now let's talk snacks. Never underestimate how many snacks hungry children (and dad's) can eat. If you have 2 kids, pack as if you have 10. If you are staying at the fair, meal plan. No one wants to be exhausted and must produce a meal for hungry people. For lunches, try pre-making sandwiches or something you can hand out that is portable, or they will be begging you for fairway treats all day!

Now let us talk about what to pack for your animal(s) - start with their feed. Bring what you are feeding them at home. Now is not the time to start something new. This could stress them out more and cause them to get sick or go off feed. They need lots of fresh water, so make sure and bring something to hold that water. They will need something to sleep on. Bring some bedding, straw, or shavings. Let us not forget something to clean up that bedding at the end of the week. Bring a wheelbarrow, hay fork, or pitchfork.

WEATHER

The weather is so unpredictable at this time of year. Be prepared for everything. It might be cold, so bring a jacket and some blankets to sleep in. It might be rainy, so be prepared for the wetness all over the grounds. It might be crazy windy and dusty, so come prepared to tie everything down; don't leave the vent on the top of the trailer open, it might fly away (experience knows). It can also be hot! You cannot run the A/C in the trailer unless you have a generator, but you can run some fans. Remember these tips for your animals as well. Keep in mind that they all have fresh haircuts, so if the temperature drops they will be cold, and if it is hot they might need some fans as well.

YOUR TACK BOX

What do you need to put in your tack box? All your grooming essentials (brushes, clippers, sprays, anything needed to make your animal look beautiful). Do not forget hoof trimmers and scissors. Let us talk about some of the unusual items found in tack boxes that have come in handy:

- A box of baking soda and a small bottle of vegetable oil with a drencher both things come in handy to
 prevent bloating in any ruminant animal.
- A fish net from the pet aisle this is a wonderful thing to fish hay and bedding out of water buckets without having to empty them.
- A watering can (especially when you have smaller kids around) this is great to top off water buckets and keep kids busy without too much of a mess.
- Cornhuskers oil is always great to have for so many things it can act as a cheap, quick show shine and it is good for your hands, too.
- Short hose with a sprayer on the end it can be used in the wash rack or if it is needed to fill buckets.
- Your show chain or halter have one per animal, because even if you think you will have time to switch between animals, you will not.
- Short lengths of chain with double sided clips are good to have in case you need to latch your gate closed or clip a bucket to the fence.

And lastly, do not forget about decorating your area to educate the public. Check with the rest of your group to see how they want to decorate. Remember that animals like to eat decorations, so they need to be far enough above them to stay safe.

Don't forget to have fun and make memories!

GREEN FOUR-LEAF CLOVER

The green four-leaf clover with the white letter "H" in each leaf is the National 4-H Emblem. The design, attributed to L.H. Benson, an Iowa school superintendent, was adopted as the national Emblem in 1911. Once enrolled as a 4-H volunteer leader, you are authorized by your local extension office to use the 4-H Name and Emblem.



The Name and Emblem are protected under the federal statue (Title 18, USC 707) and may only be used in accordance with statue requirements. Only use an official Emblem graphic obtained from an authorized 4-H source which includes the language "18 USC 707" to the right of the stem. Your extension office can provide camera ready or electronic versions of the clover for your use. Text or graphics should never cross the clover emblem.

Green and white are the 4-H colors. Green is nature's most common color and symbolizes youth, life and growth. White stands for purity and high ideals.

ABOUT 4-H...

WHAT IS 4-H? 4-H is the largest youth-serving organization in the world. 4-H is an organization that serves youth--not just boys and not just girls. From 4-H clubs to special interest groups to school enrichment projects, 4-H includes both boys and girls in activities. 4-H is the youth education component of Cooperative Extension, which is conducted jointly by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the state land grant university (The University of Arizona), and your county government. 4-H Youth Development has a unique link with a variety of resources from The University of Arizona.

While 4-H has its beginnings in rural America, 4-H now serves young people and volunteers from major urban centers and from suburban communities and rural non-farm settings as well.

4-H AND THE COMMUNITY! 4-H doesn't stop with its impact on young people and their families. An integral part of the popularity of 4-H is that it reaches into the communities in which these families live. As part of their 4-H experience, young people are encouraged to develop a better understanding of their communities and to contribute to community betterment.

4-H IS A FAMILY AFFAIR! 4-H encourages participation by the entire family. Youth enroll as 4-H members. Other family members help out as club leaders, project leaders, meeting helpers, transportation aides--you name it. Four-H is definitely a family affair.

Most importantly, 4-H families work together on projects and activities, attend meetings and events together and learn together through 4-H. In the process, family members learn more about each other through their involvement in 4-H. They may even become better families, appreciating each other's strengths and talents just a bit better.

WHAT ARE THE 4 H's? The 4 H's stand for Head, Hands, Heart, and Health. The 4 H's represent the four-fold training and development that 4-H'ers receive. At first there were three "H's"

with the fourth "H" of "Health" being added. Together the 4 H's symbolize: the development of HEAD, to think, plan and reason; the HEART, to be concerned with the welfare of others, accept the responsibilities of citizenship, and develop positive attitudes; the HANDS, to be useful, helpful, and skillful; and HEALTH, to practice healthful living, enjoy life and use leisure time productively.

WHAT'S THE 4-H EMBLEM? A green four-leaf clover with a white "H" on each clover leaf. The design, attributed to L.H. Benson, An lowa school superintendent, was adopted as the national emblem in 1911. Similar to a copyright, legislation has been passed so that the 4-H name and emblem may only be used as approved by 4-H.

WHAT'S THE 4-H PLEDGE?

I pledge...
My Head to Clearer Thinking,
My Heart to Greater Loyalty,
My Hands to Larger Service,
and My Health to Better Living.
For my Club, my Community, my Country, and my World.

In repeating the pledge, a member raises the right hand to the side of the head when saying "head", points to their heart when saying "heart", extends hands, palms upward when saying "hands" and then stands straight when speaking rest of the pledge. The pledge was adopted in 1927 during the first National 4-H Club Camp in Washington, D.C. Otis Hall, state 4-H Leader in Kansas was responsible for the original wording, which remained unchanged until 1973 when the words" any my world" were added.

WHAT'S THE 4-H MOTTO? "To Make the Best Better" The motto was proposed by Carried Harrison, a botanist with the U.S. Bureau of Plant Industry and was officially adopted in 1927 when the 4-H Pledge was introduced.

WHAT IS THE 4-H YEAR? The Arizona 4-H Youth Development program year is October 1 through September 30.
