LEARN MORE THROUGH 4-H ABOUT GARDENING & FEEDING YOUR FAMILY

Through efforts supported by 4-H donations, Pinal County 4-H has the opportunity to give youth and families a chance to explore the broad scope of plant sciences. The county gave us permission a few years ago to create a unique garden space outside our county building to demonstrate how to garden with raised beds, pallets, straw bales, containers and even a keyhole planter!

Concepts acquired involve basic seed to plate ideas for youth to learn about planning a garden space, planting, seasonal fruit and vegetable production, how to maintain a garden and how to cultivate plant life for beauty, health and cuisine. Plants play a vital role for animals and humans providing shelter, food, fiber, medicine, oxygen and beauty. Inside the 4-H office we have numerous curriculum pieces you can look at to share this program with your club members. Arizona 4-H offers the following curriculum: See Them Sprout, Let's Get Growing, Take Your Pick, Growing Profits, and a Gardening Exhibits Guide.

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Introducing the New Online Quality Assurance Curriculum

The animal industry recognizes the public concern for the safety and well-being of animals, and is focused on providing a safe food supply to consumers. Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) is a national quality assurance program for youth livestock producers aged 8 to 21. The YQCA program covers the seven, major species of food producing animals: beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, sheep, goats, poultry, and rabbits. To assist various education levels with meeting the learning objectives, the curriculum content is targeted to four age groups: Junior (8-11), Intermediate (12-14), Senior (15-18), and Young Adult (19-21).

The online modules have three sections that make up approximately one-hour of training time including a content builder, skills lab, and a quiz. For each year's certification, youth will have topics focused on food safety, animal well-being, and life skills. The YQCA certification is good for one year and youth only complete it once annually regardless of the number of species shown.

YLQA workshops may continue to be offered through December 31, 2017. Certificates are valid until their expiration date.

Starting January 1, 2018, only YQCA certifications (online or instructor-led) will be offered.

Most fairs will continue to accept Arizona Youth Livestock Quality Assurance certifications until all currently valid certificates expire. Please make sure to check your county/state fair requirements to see if the show you want to enter has any additional requirements. Currently the YQCA is good for one year, however, a test out option where a member can test out until they age into the next age bracket should be available in late 2018.

YQCA is available as an online program for youth across the United States. YQCA in-person (instructor led) workshops are available from certified trainers. Only Extension personnel, FFA Advisors or Veterinarians are eligible to be certified to conduct an instructor led training. Volunteers can work with extension personnel or ag advisors to conduct an instructor led training. Members may go online and


