

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PINAL COUNTY 4-H FAIR—WE'RE GOING HYBRID

Purpose of a Hybrid Fair

While many 4-H fairs across the country have been cancelled, Pinal County 4-H and its volunteers want to make sure they can still host an event for our 4-H small-stock and building project members.

Due to the restrictions currently in place by COVID-19, many county fairs are looking at options for how to showcase 4-H'ers and judge 4-H exhibits/contests.

A hybrid fair gives 4-H youth the opportunity to exhibit their 4-H projects and demonstrate what they have learned, some in person and others in an online platform. A hybrid fair is all about learning and having fun!

Small stock and some contests will have judging that will be done in person on March 13th and March 15th at the Maricopa Agricultural Center, with only a few people allowed to attend outside of the judges and participants. Please check fair exhibitor handbook for specific dates, times, and rules.

Building Exhibits will be held through a virtual fair. A virtual fair gives 4-H youth the opportunity to exhibit their 4-H projects and demonstrations online to showcase what they have learned.

4-H members that participate in the exhibit will be awarded virtual ribbons and will receive feedback from judges. Fair ribbons will be mailed to the participants at the conclusion of the event. There are no entry fees.

Process for Entering Exhibits

All registration will be done through ShoWorks at http://pinal4.fairmanager.com/. Entries will be submitted, judged, and the results will be shared all online. By and large, entries for the virtual fair will be submitted as photos, files, or videos at the time of registration.

ARIZONA 4-H ENGAGED CITIZENS EVENT

The Arizona 4-H Engaged Citizens Event was a virtual experience, like a day-long event at the Arizona State Capital. The event supports the educational objective of the Arizona 4-H Youth Development program to develop civically minded citizens today and into the future.

Youth were welcomed by Arizona 4-H alumni, State Senator Sine Kerr and Representative Tim Dunn. Youth had sessions with current and former legislators and government relations professionals covering topics like; how does a bill become a law, what are careers in government service; and, how to communicate with legislators. Our Pinal County youth met with their State Senate, Senator Shope and House Legislator, Representative Barton.

The Arizona 4-H Engaged Citizens Event (ECE) event is made possible by Arizona 4-H Youth Foundation partners Arizona Farm Bureau and the University of Arizona Cooperative Extension.

10 ACTIVITIES TO DO DURING ZOOM MEETINGS

Having an online meeting can be rough to do based on being all of sudden needing to do them. If you got a few new members or want to get to know each other, later on I will discuss a few things to help in recreation. These activities can vary in length but can easily be done in a five to ten minutes. With no further ado, here is a list of 10 things you can change up your meetings a little.



- 1) The first little activity I like to call, Around the World of Zoom. A little game that is similar to I Spy but everyone else finds an object in their room that fits the statement said. You can then explain why you grabbed that item or even put a 30 to 60 second time limit per statement. You then go around until everyone has gone at least once, maybe twice if you want to allot more time.
- 2) At number two, there is "Who's that Team Member?" This little exercise requires a little bit of set-up. Before the meeting, you'll have to gather a little information about who will be attending the meeting. This usually involves neutral questions, like their favorite hobbies, hidden talents, favorite movies, etc. Then you can have a minute or so discussion about who they thing it is. Once they do, they write down their answers. Whom ever gets the most right, gets the bragging right.
- 3) For the third activity, an interesting one could Office Party Mad Libs. For those who are creative enough you can create a work-based team-building story, or you can search through the internet to find a pre-made story. Then go down the line until you run out of blank spots. If you have too big of a group, you could do break-out rooms.
- 4) If you want a laugh then this fourth one may be for you. "Sell It" is a game where you ask everyone to grab an item before telling them what they have to do. Then you ask everyone to try to sell the item as if they were a salesperson. You can delegate about a minute per person to sell the item. Then at the end, everyone could say who had done it best.
- 5) "A Vacation around the Screen" is another where everyone uses their environment. This is where they can look around, and potentially show, in order to convey where their dream vacation. In a fashion similar to these other activities, the timing is variable and similar in play through.
- 6) Number six on the list is "Zoom-along", which is similar to any sing-along. Except this time, it is over zoom. You'll probably would choose 2 or 3 songs that have either a karaoke version or a audio version.
- 7) Seventh activity is *Pictionary*. This can go several rounds if you feel like you want to do this longer than a few minutes. At least one person in the group knows how to play the game that you can buy at the store.
- 8) Another activity is "One Word at a Time", but it isn't about who is speaking right now. The objective of this activity is to go around to everyone to make a coherent story. The only catch, you can only add 1 word to the paragraph per turn. You go until either a word doesn't make sense or until you have an end to the story. If you have the former error in only a few turns, go until you feel comfortable the story is long enough and appears to be at a good point.
- 9) The second to last activity on this list is "Pack for the Oregon Trail". This activity can be separated into teams, using breakout rooms, and discussed between each team. The whole idea is to either choose 5 items, that are carriable, to bring with you on your way on up the Oregon Trail. Each team will have a different strategy and some may only bring their prized possessions while others bring their essentials. You can designate a 3-minute team meeting and a 2-minute discussion. This activity may also help gather a little bit of insight into who your team members are.
- 10) Last but not least is "Guess That". This is where you can gather either songs or movies and either create or find clues to the title. They will write their answers down and gain bragging rights for having the most correct answers.

2021 NATIONAL 4-H BEEKEEPING ESSAY—CALLING ALL ARIZONA 4-H YOUTH MEMBERS!

Are you interested in writing? Submit an essay to this year's National 4-H Beekeeping Essay Competition! The topic is "Immunity: Threats to Bee Colonies and Methods to Defend Against the Threats". You must write about at least two threats to honey bee colonies and the methods to defend against them. The full prompt and more information can be found here.

Essay requirements for national judging:

- Essay must be typewritten or computer-generated on single-sided pages and formatted following standard manuscript format, using double-spaced type and 12-point font in legible font face.
- Essay must encompass the designated topic in 750 to 1,000 words. Word count does not include sources, works cited or the writer's biographical statement.
- All factual statements and interview references must be cited in a "sources" or "bibliography" list.
- Essays will be judged on (a) scope of research, 40%; (b) accuracy, 30%; (c) creativity, 10%; (d) conciseness, 10%; and (e) logical development of the topic, 10%.

On a separate page, please include a brief biographical statement about the writer and include mailing address, email address and phone number.

National Awards

Three cash prizes will be awarded in the 2021 National 4-H Beekeeping Essay Competition. The author of the highest scoring essay will win first prize. The author of the second-highest scoring essay will win second prize. The author of the third-highest scoring essay will win third prize.

First Prize: \$750Second Prize: \$500Third Prize: \$250

Submission Information and Deadlines

Essays will only be accepted from Active 4-H youth, meaning you must be enrolled in ZingBooks for the 2020-2021 year. Please submit your essay by **March 22, 2021** to ashparra97@arizona.edu. The Arizona 4-H State Office will review all submissions and will choose one entry to submit from Arizona for national review by April 1.

GREEN FOUR-LEAF CLOVER

The green four-leaf clover with the white letter "H" in each leaf is the National 4-H Emblem. The design, attributed to L.H. Benson, an Iowa school superintendent, was adopted as the national Emblem in 1911. Once enrolled as a 4-H volunteer leader, you are authorized by your local extension office to use the 4-H Name and Emblem.

The Name and Emblem are protected under the federal statue (Title 18, USC 707) and may only be used in accordance with statue requirements. Only use an official Emblem graphic obtained from an authorized 4-H source which includes the language "18 USC 707" to the right of the stem. Your extension office can provide camera ready or electronic versions of the clover for your use. Text or graphics should never cross the clover emblem.

Green and white are the 4-H colors. Green is nature's most common color and symbolizes youth, life and growth. White stands for purity and high ideals.

ABOUT 4-H...

WHAT IS 4-H? 4-H is the largest youth-serving organization in the world. 4-H is an organization that serves youth--not just boys and not just girls. From 4-H clubs to special interest groups to school enrichment projects, 4-H includes both boys and girls in activities. 4-H is the youth education component of Cooperative Extension, which is conducted jointly by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the state land grant university (The University of Arizona), and your county government. 4-H Youth Development has a unique link with a variety of resources from The University of Arizona.

While 4-H has its beginnings in rural America, 4-H now serves young people and volunteers from major urban centers and from suburban communities and rural non-farm settings as well.

4-H AND THE COMMUNITY! 4-H doesn't stop with its impact on young people and their families. An integral part of the popularity of 4-H is that it reaches into the communities in which these families live. As part of their 4-H experience, young people are encouraged to develop a better understanding of their communities and to contribute to community betterment.

4-H IS A FAMILY AFFAIR! 4-H encourages participation by the entire family. Youth enroll as 4-H members. Other family members help out as club leaders, project leaders, meeting helpers, transportation aides--you name it. Four-H is definitely a family affair.

Most importantly, 4-H families work together on projects and activities, attend meetings and events together and learn together through 4-H. In the process, family members learn more about each other through their involvement in 4-H. They may even become better families, appreciating each other's strengths and talents just a bit better.

WHAT ARE THE 4 H's? The 4 H's stand for Head, Hands, Heart, and Health. The 4 H's represent the four-fold training and development that 4-H'ers receive. At first there were three "H's"

with the fourth "H" of "Health" being added. Together the 4 H's symbolize: the development of HEAD, to think, plan and reason; the HEART, to be concerned with the welfare of others, accept the responsibilities of citizenship, and develop positive attitudes; the HANDS, to be useful, helpful, and skillful; and HEALTH, to practice healthful living, enjoy life and use leisure time productively.

WHAT'S THE 4-H EMBLEM? A green four-leaf clover with a white "H" on each clover leaf. The design, attributed to L.H. Benson, An lowa school superintendent, was adopted as the national emblem in 1911. Similar to a copyright, legislation has been passed so that the 4-H name and emblem may only be used as approved by 4-H.

WHAT'S THE 4-H PLEDGE?

I pledge...
My Head to Clearer Thinking,
My Heart to Greater Loyalty,
My Hands to Larger Service,
and My Health to Better Living.
For my Club, my Community, my Country, and my World.

In repeating the pledge, a member raises the right hand to the side of the head when saying "head", points to their heart when saying "heart", extends hands, palms upward when saying "hands" and then stands straight when speaking rest of the pledge. The pledge was adopted in 1927 during the first National 4-H Club Camp in Washington, D.C. Otis Hall, state 4-H Leader in Kansas was responsible for the original wording, which remained unchanged until 1973 when the words" any my world" were added.

WHAT'S THE 4-H MOTTO? "To Make the Best Better" The motto was proposed by Carried Harrison, a botanist with the U.S. Bureau of Plant Industry and was officially adopted in 1927 when the 4-H Pledge was introduced.

WHAT IS THE 4-H YEAR? The Arizona 4-H Youth Development program year is October 1 through September 30.
