4-H PINAL COUNTY FAIR

By now you should have received an email from Maria Melendez with an electronic file of the Fair Book; this year's theme is "80s Then, 80s Now". If you have questions about how / what classes to enter, please talk with your project leader or club leader. If leaders are stumped, please reach out to our office and we will help you navigate the fair book.

Three important things to remember:

I PLEDGE MY HEAD

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- The deadline to enter your exhibits for Fair is <u>March 8, 2020</u>. All 4-H entries can be found at ShoWorks (<u>http://pinal4.fairmanager.com</u>) until midnight on March 8th.
- Be sure you/your members <u>print their tags</u> for each entry and attach them to their entries. <u>No tags will be</u> printed in the Pinal County Extension office or at the fair.
- Fair passes will be ordered/purchased through your 4-H Club Leader. The information has already been sent to them and orders are due to our office in the next 3 weeks; your leader will make an appointment to meet with Maria and finalize your club's order, so talk with your club leader now to order.

Showing livestock at the fair can be very stressful for the animals and the people involved. It's best to be prepared for injuries and illnesses that can occur. Make sure you talk with your project leader about issues that could arise and what you can do to be prepared to address them. Cooperative Extension also has a publication that can help titled, "Being Prepared for Show Livestock Injuries and Illnesses" and you can download it at <u>https://extension.arizona.edu/sites/extension.arizona.edu/files/pubs/az1373.pdf</u>.

4-H Expo

At the Fair Committee Meeting, the decision was made to move the 4-H Expo event until several weeks AFTER the Fair. Dates have not been set yet, but we are most likely going to hold this event after Easter. More will be sent to you as soon as it's available.

In case you didn't participate last year in our inaugural event, the Expo is where members can display their skills in public speaking, job interview, fashion review, cooking, S.T.E.M., Hippology, and other activities that are not conducted at the Fair.

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NATIONAL EVENTS FOR 4-H MEMBERS

National 4-H Conference

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- Applications due November for the event held in March-April in Washington, DC
- Age Requirement: Must be 16 by January 1st
- Registration cost ~\$2,000 due in December after selection of delegates has been made

Leadership Washington Focus (LWF)

- Applications due in early January for the event held in July
- Age Requirement: 7th to 9th graders
- Estimated cost per person is between \$1,400 to \$1,500

Citizenship Washington Focus (CWF)

- Applications due in early January for the event held in late June
- Age Requirement: 14 to 19 years
- Estimated costs per person is between \$1,800 to \$1,900

National 4-H Congress

- Arizona 4-H members must submit their Record Books to their County 4-H office to be judged; county will then send their selections on to the State 4-H office to be judged and the delegates selected
- The event is held in late November (after Thanksgiving) each year in Atlanta, GA
- Age Requirement: High School aged 4-H members
- Registration cost: estimate not available, but expect to be like LWF and CWF

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JOANN CAMPAIGN

In recent years this campaign had challenges with implementation at the store level. Although JOANN has implemented new incentives for their stores to participate it's still very likely that we will see challenges. As a result, we have a new system in place for reporting those. If you or others in your state notice a lack of participation, Tear-away boards not displayed, employees not asking about the campaign or other things like that you can go to this site and report it. It's fine to share this link with your county folks, we want to know what's going on at the store level. https://forms.gle/sQJCXhuQsnDG5jmj7

When you share the link please let them know that JOANN and 4-H are monitoring the sheet together. It's fine to be honest and real, but please also be kind. Even though we've had some challenges we very much appreciate the partnership of JOANN and what they are trying to do to help grow and support 4-H. I would also give the stores until at least the 8th before reporting issues. Occasionally materials are shipped late and arrive at the store a few days after the campaign beings. Lastly, just as an FYI the only promotional materials that will be in-store is the tear away display at the register. If you have questions about that (or anything else) please give me call or shoot me an email.

ABOUT 4-H...

WHAT IS 4-H? 4-H is the largest youth-serving organization in the world. 4-H is an organization that serves youth--not just boys and not just girls. From 4-H clubs to special interest groups to school enrichment projects, 4-H includes both boys and girls in activities. 4-H is the youth education component of Cooperative Extension, which is conducted jointly by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the state land grant university (The University of Arizona), and your county government. 4-H Youth Development has a unique link with a variety of resources from The University of Arizona.

While 4-H has its beginnings in rural America, 4-H now serves young people and volunteers from major urban centers and from suburban communities and rural non-farm settings as well.

4-H AND THE COMMUNITY! 4-H doesn't stop with its impact on young people and their families. An integral part of the popularity of 4-H is that it reaches into the communities in which these families live. As part of their 4-H experience, young people are encouraged to develop a better understanding of their communities and to contribute to community betterment.

4-H IS A FAMILY AFFAIR! 4-H encourages participation by the entire family. Youth enroll as 4-H members. Other family members help out as club leaders, project leaders, meeting helpers, transportation aides--you name it. Four-H is definitely a family affair.

Most importantly, 4-H families work together on projects and activities, attend meetings and events together and learn together through 4-H. In the process, family members learn more about each other through their involvement in 4-H. They may even become better families, appreciating each other's strengths and talents just a bit better.

WHAT ARE THE 4 H's? The 4 H's stand for Head, Hands, Heart, and Health. The 4 H's represent the four-fold training and development that 4-H'ers receive. At first there were three "H's" with the fourth "H" of "Health" being added. Together the 4 H's symbolize: the development of HEAD, to

think, plan and reason; the HEART, to be concerned with the welfare of others, accept the responsibilities of citizenship, and develop positive attitudes; the HANDS, to be useful, helpful, and skillful; and HEALTH, to practice healthful living, enjoy life and use leisure time productively.

WHAT'S THE 4-H EMBLEM? A green four-leaf clover with a white "H" on each clover leaf. The design, attributed to L.H. Benson, An Iowa school superintendent, was adopted as the national emblem in 1911. Similar to a copyright, legislation has been passed so that the 4-H name and emblem may only be used as approved by 4-H.

WHAT'S THE 4-H PLEDGE?

I pledge... My **Head** to Clearer Thinking, My **Heart** to Greater Loyalty, My **Hands** to Larger Service, and My **Health** to Better Living. For my Club, my Community, my Country, and my World.

In repeating the pledge, a member raises the right hand to the side of the head when saying "head", points to their heart when saying "heart", extends hands, palms upward when saying "hands" and then stands straight when speaking rest of the pledge. The pledge was adopted in 1927 during the first National 4-H Club Camp in Washington, D.C. Otis Hall, state 4-H Leader in Kansas was responsible for the original wording, which remained unchanged until 1973 when the words" any my world" were added.

WHAT'S THE 4-H MOTTO? "To Make the Best Better" The motto was proposed by Carried Harrison, a botanist with the U.S. Bureau of Plant Industry and was officially adopted in 1927 when the 4-H Pledge was introduced.

WHAT IS THE 4-H YEAR? The Arizona 4-H Youth Development program year is October 1 through September 30.

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
