done we got to relax. We walked all over and checked out the booths and the other cool stuff. One of our favorite things was a special lemonade called the Texas Twister. It was so good.





On March 9, 2023, 4-H Members and 4-H Professionals from the State of Arizona flew from Tucson, AZ to Washington, DC. There were approximately 27 members who attended the event from various counties (Cochise, Greenlee, Navajo, Pima, Pinal and Santa Cruz). While waiting for our flight, I met members from the other counties and with some, we became instant friends. These were members with similar likes and views for our communities.

At the event and during our workshops, we learned of the different causes of teenage stress today. Three of the main causes are about how they look, if people like them, and social media platforms. This has become a big problem in their self-esteem, and how they envision their life moving forward. These types of stress shouldn't affect teens, as they should accept themselves as they are and live life to the fullest. We also learned how to deal with people who tell you, "you can't do something". The simple answer is to do your best to achieve that goal and prove them wrong.

In our workshops, we learned about the importance of knowing what the needs of the community are. If there is a problem with food and people need to eat - we try our best to hold or navigate these people to a food shelter and get them free food to survive one-day-at-a-time. We also learned about how important it is to make time for yourself and connect with family; many of whom are always on their phones and tuning out on the world. If you fall prey to this, you will begin to lose yourself and also lose family time. How might you feel if someone were to ask about a family member and you didn't know the answer, wouldn't you be embarrassed? Make time now! One other important piece of these workshops was getting to meet new people and making connections with those around the world. Who knows when you might need that connection on day!

This experience opened my eyes to the world around us. There are opportunities out there to experience by being open to engage in organizations like 4-H and becoming a member. I was lucky enough do just that and loved the adventure it took me on – to Washington DC! How often does a person get the chance to see iconic monuments like the Lincoln Memorial, Washington Monument and the White House! I never thought that would be me, but look at me now!

Although honey bees are much-beloved for honey, bees also produce beeswax that can be used in many ways. For this essay, a 4-H student should discuss why beeswax is so important to the hive (it's a pantry, it's a nursery, it's the dance floor), but also discuss their favorite way to use beeswax outside the hive. of candles, soaps, or lip balms that are made to show the 4-H'er's skill in using beeswax are welcomed as are recipes or brief instructions.

Eligibility: The 2023 National 4-H Beekeeping Essay Competition is open to active 4-H Club members only. Any 4-H Club member who placed first, second or third in previous years of the national competition is NOT eligible to win in 2023; however, state competition winners remain eligible to enter the national competition. Essays entered must encompass the designated topic only. There will be no exceptions.

Competition Rules & Essay Requirements: Any 4-H Club member interested in writing an essay should contact their local 4-H office for competition details. The state selection process must be completed through the 4-H system. Failure to meet any one of the essay requirements will result in disqualification.

Essay Requirements for National Judging: Essays must be typewritten or computer-generated on single-sided pages and formatted following standard manuscript format using double-spaced type and 12pt font in a legible font face.

Essays must encompass the designated topic in 750 to 1,000 words. Word count does not include sources, works cited, or the writer's biographical statement.

All factual statements and interview references must be cited in a "sources" or "bibliography."

On a separate page, please include a brief biographical statement of the writer including mailing address, email address, and phone number.

The deadline for national submission is May 1, 2023. National winners will be announced: June 15, 2023

Awards: Three cash prizes will be awarded in the 2023 National 4-H Beekeeping Essay Competition. The author of the highest-scoring essay will win first prize. The author of the second-highest scoring essay will win second prize. The author of the third-highest scoring essay will win third prize.

- First Prize: \$750
- Second Prize: \$500
- Third Prize: \$250

GREEN FOUR-LEAF CLOVER

The green four-leaf clover with the white letter "H" in each leaf is the National 4-H Emblem. The design, attributed to L.H. Benson, an Iowa school superintendent, was adopted as the national Emblem in 1911. Once enrolled as a 4-H volunteer leader, you are authorized by your local extension office to use the 4-H Name and Emblem.

The Name and Emblem are protected under the federal statue (Title 18, USC 707) and may only be used in accordance with statue requirements. Only use an official Emblem graphic obtained from an authorized 4-H source which includes the language "18 USC 707" to the right of the stem. Your extension office can provide camera ready or electronic versions of the clover for your use. Text or graphics should never cross the clover emblem.



Green and white are the 4-H colors. Green is nature's most common color and symbolizes youth, life and growth. White stands for purity and high ideals.

ABOUT 4-H...

WHAT IS 4-H? 4-H is the largest youth-serving organization in the world. 4-H is an organization that serves youth--not just boys and not just girls. From 4-H clubs to special interest groups to school enrichment projects, 4-H includes both boys and girls in activities. 4 -H is the youth education component of Cooperative Extension, which is conducted jointly by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the state land grant university (The University of Arizona), and your county government. 4-H Youth Development has a unique link with a variety of resources from The University of Arizona.

While 4-H has its beginnings in rural America, 4-H now serves young people and volunteers from major urban centers and from suburban communities and rural non-farm settings as well.

4-H AND THE COMMUNITY! 4-H doesn't stop with its impact on young people and their families. An integral part of the popularity of 4-H is that it reaches into the communities in which these families live. As part of their 4-H experience, young people are encouraged to develop a better understanding of their communities and to contribute to community betterment.

4-H IS A FAMILY AFFAIR! 4-H encourages participation by the entire family. Youth enroll as 4-H members. Other family members help out as club leaders, project leaders, meeting helpers, transportation aides--you name it. Four-H is definitely a family affair.

Most importantly, 4-H families work together on projects and activities, attend meetings and events together and learn together through 4-H. In the process, family members learn more about each other through their involvement in 4-H. They may even become better families, appreciating each other's strengths and talents just a bit better.

WHAT ARE THE 4 H's? The 4 H's stand for Head, Hands, Heart, and Health. The 4 H's represent the four-fold training and development that 4-H'ers receive. At first there were three "H's"

with the fourth "H" of "Health" being added. Together the 4 H's symbolize: the development of HEAD, to think, plan and reason; the HEART, to be concerned with the welfare of others, accept the responsibilities of citizenship, and develop positive attitudes; the HANDS, to be useful, helpful, and skillful; and HEALTH, to practice healthful living, enjoy life and use leisure time productively.

WHAT'S THE 4-H EMBLEM? A green four-leaf clover with a white "H" on each clover leaf. The design, attributed to L.H. Benson, An lowa school superintendent, was adopted as the national emblem in 1911. Similar to a copyright, legislation has been passed so that the 4-H name and emblem may only be used as approved by 4-H.

WHAT'S THE 4-H PLEDGE?

I pledge... My **Head** to Clearer Thinking, My **Heart** to Greater Loyalty, My **Hands** to Larger Service, and My **Health** to Better Living. For my Club, my Community, my Country, and my World.

In repeating the pledge, a member raises the right hand to the side of the head when saying "head", points to their heart when saying "heart", extends hands, palms upward when saying "hands" and then stands straight when speaking rest of the pledge. The pledge was adopted in 1927 during the first National 4-H Club Camp in Washington, D.C. Otis Hall, state 4-H Leader in Kansas was responsible for the original wording, which remained unchanged until 1973 when the words" any my world" were added.

WHAT'S THE 4-H MOTTO? "To Make the Best Better" The motto was proposed by Carried Harrison, a botanist with the U.S. Bureau of Plant Industry and was officially adopted in 1927 when the 4-H Pledge was introduced.

WHAT IS THE 4-H YEAR? The Arizona 4-H Youth Development program year is October 1 through September 30.
