If you're a 4-H Member, now is a great time to start thinking about what project(s) you want to take in the new year and to spread the word to friends and family so they are thinking about maybe joining 4-H. UA Cooperative Extension Administration has decided to cover the enrollment fee for every youth member in the coming year! It's also time to start on your 4-H Record Book, which you can now do in Zingbooks! Check the calendar at the end of the newsletter for the upcoming Record Book Training via zoom.

If you're a project leader, now is a great time to plan for your project meetings for the coming year. Your members will be filling out their goals for the new year when they do their record books, so you'll be able to get a sneak peek of what they are thinking about to help you with your meeting planning. It's also a great time, if you'll be teaching a new project, to order a copy of the project curriculum and review it so you have a good handle on the content and flow for those meetings too.

If you're a club leader, now is a great time to poll members about what projects they want to take and recruit new volunteers so you can offer them. It may also be a good time for you and your volunteers to get together and plan the calendar for the new year. It's also a good time to find out what steps do your volunteers who are in the process of getting certified still need – and see if you or our office can help them complete. Don't forget that volunteers who are not yet certified are required to have a certified volunteer attend their project meetings so you may need to figure out who will be doing that as needed. It's also a good time to meet with your club officers (if you elected them already for the new year) and do some training with them so they feel comfortable with their new responsibilities.

We are aware of a couple of clubs that will be going through change of leadership this fall. If your club is in this category, please let as know as soon as possible so we can assist with that transition.




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PINAL COUNTY 4-H STEM PROJECTS

Pinal County Cooperative Extension's 4-H program is currently offering STEM -related programs at their office on Saturdays. With the fourth STEM Saturday on June 5th, we draw closer to the last one on June 19th. Do not worry if you missed these events, STEM in Pinal County is here to stay. STEM is for those who are interested in a field under the four categories and are not mutually exclusive fields. STEM is an acronym for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics. Each of these fields can help you advance in several different careers and hobbies. Science can range from Livestock, doctor, farming/ranching, and gardening. Technology can range anywhere from medical equipment repair, cellular network maintenance, or working for Elon Musk. Engineering can include the previous jobs and include anything else that requires building things, designing things, or even coding the programs for these things. Mathematics is all about numbers, which most of the other three fields rely on. Without mathematics, we could not

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even do the most basic of daily tasks (like adding up the costs of two items at the store) and all these fields may not be as efficient as they are today.

Like I said earlier, these fields are not mutually exclusive. For example, a job that combines all four fields is a Nurse. For this job, you would use the most recent technology to help your patients. You also need to understand healthy rates and doses for your patients, which brings in math and science. Sometimes equipment temporarily needs to be used manually, knowing how they work, or an alternative piece of equipment can help save a life that is in danger during a power outage. An engineer is not always where all four come together though, look at what Temple Grandin has done with livestock management and humane treatment of livestock. She has done dozens of things over the last 50 plus years that have helped the livestock industry, including designing a couple of designs for machines. With these few examples, do you have in mind what STEM careers interest you?

If so, there are even summer camps that are going to be available through 4-H's state office that are available. With the new 4-H year starting in September, it is an easy way to kick it off before the year starts. In July, there are three STEM advertised activities. They all start on July 6th, end on July 30th, and are on selected days of the week. There is Robotics 101/102/Python Gym Virtual Summer Camp (Mon, Wed), and Greenhouse Sustainable Energy Engineering Design Hybrid Summer Camp (Mon-Fri). The first two are open to anyone from the 5th grade until 12th. The Greenhouse Camp is open to 6th grade until 12th grades. 
HOW TO SUPPORT YOUR 4-H CLUB

4-H YD PROGRAM & TRACTOR SUPPLY

Tractor Supply proudly began its partnership with 4-H in 2010 and has since helped raise over \$14 million nationwide through its Paper Clover fundraisers in local stores. These funds have impacted over 69,000 youth across the US by providing access to hands-on learning experiences in STEM, agriculture, healthy living, and civic engagement opportunities.

100% of the funds raised through the two fundraising campaigns held each year (in the spring and the fall) directly benefit 4-H youth – 90% of donations raised in AZ stay in AZ, and 10% support national 4-H programming.

The Spring Tractor Supply campaign ended May 9th, but now is a great time to start planning for the Fall campaign which will run from October 6th thru the 17th. GREEN FOUR-LEAF CLOVER

The green four-leaf clover with the white letter "H" in each leaf is the National 4-H Emblem. The design, attributed to L.H. Benson, an Iowa school superintendent, was adopted as the national Emblem in 1911. Once enrolled as a 4-H volunteer leader, you are authorized by your local extension office to use the 4-H Name and Emblem.



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The Name and Emblem are protected under the federal statue (Title 18, USC 707) and may only be used in accordance with statue requirements. Only use an official Emblem graphic obtained from an authorized 4-H source which includes the language "18 USC 707" to the right of the stem. Your extension office can provide camera ready or electronic versions of the clover for your use. Text or graphics should never cross the clover emblem.

Green and white are the 4-H colors. Green is nature's most common color and symbolizes youth, life and growth. White stands for purity and high ideals.

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ABOUT 4-H...

WHAT IS 4-H? 4-H is the largest youth-serving organization in the world. 4-H is an organization that serves youth--not just boys and not just girls. From 4-H clubs to special interest groups to school enrichment projects, 4-H includes both boys and girls in activities. 4 -H is the youth education component of Cooperative Extension, which is conducted jointly by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the state land grant university (The University of Arizona), and your county government. 4-H Youth Development has a unique link with a variety of resources from The University of Arizona.

While 4-H has its beginnings in rural America, 4-H now serves young people and volunteers from major urban centers and from suburban communities and rural non-farm settings as well.

4-H AND THE COMMUNITY! 4-H doesn't stop with its impact on young people and their families. An integral part of the popularity of 4-H is that it reaches into the communities in which these families live. As part of their 4-H experience, young people are encouraged to develop a better understanding of their communities and to contribute to community betterment.

4-H IS A FAMILY AFFAIR! 4-H encourages participation by the entire family. Youth enroll as 4-H members. Other family members help out as club leaders, project leaders, meeting helpers, transportation aides--you name it. Four-H is definitely a family affair.

Most importantly, 4-H families work together on projects and activities, attend meetings and events together and learn together through 4-H. In the process, family members learn more about each other through their involvement in 4-H. They may even become better families, appreciating each other's strengths and talents just a bit better.

WHAT ARE THE 4 H's? The 4 H's stand for Head, Hands, Heart, and Health. The 4 H's represent the four-fold training and development that 4-H'ers receive. At first there were three "H's"

with the fourth "H" of "Health" being added. Together the 4 H's symbolize: the development of HEAD, to think, plan and reason; the HEART, to be concerned with the welfare of others, accept the responsibilities of citizenship, and develop positive attitudes; the HANDS, to be useful, helpful, and skillful; and HEALTH, to practice healthful living, enjoy life and use leisure time productively.

WHAT'S THE 4-H EMBLEM? A green four-leaf clover with a white "H" on each clover leaf. The design, attributed to L.H. Benson, An lowa school superintendent, was adopted as the national emblem in 1911. Similar to a copyright, legislation has been passed so that the 4-H name and emblem may only be used as approved by 4-H.

WHAT'S THE 4-H PLEDGE?

I pledge... My **Head** to Clearer Thinking, My **Heart** to Greater Loyalty, My **Hands** to Larger Service, and My **Health** to Better Living. For my Club, my Community, my Country, and my World.

In repeating the pledge, a member raises the right hand to the side of the head when saying "head", points to their heart when saying "heart", extends hands, palms upward when saying "hands" and then stands straight when speaking rest of the pledge. The pledge was adopted in 1927 during the first National 4-H Club Camp in Washington, D.C. Otis Hall, state 4-H Leader in Kansas was responsible for the original wording, which remained unchanged until 1973 when the words" any my world" were added.

WHAT'S THE 4-H MOTTO? "To Make the Best Better" The motto was proposed by Carried Harrison, a botanist with the U.S. Bureau of Plant Industry and was officially adopted in 1927 when the 4-H Pledge was introduced.

WHAT IS THE 4-H YEAR? The Arizona 4-H Youth Development program year is October 1 through September 30.

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
