


History of Old West Shotgun



12 or 20 Gauge Muzzle Loading Shotgun with Ornate Carving. Often Called "Fowling Piece". Muskets could be Used as Shotguns if Loaded with Shot.



Colt Revolving Shotgun. Dangerous to Place Hand in Front of Cylinder. Could also Blow Shot into Face.



Single Shot Shotguns Very Common.

The 1875 P. Powell & Son catalog advertises Remington's double barrel shotgun in 10 or 12 gauge for \$45.00 to \$75.00 depending on grade while the single barreled gun could be had for \$23.00. Courtesy of Cornell Publications.



Colt Model 1878 Shotgun. Standard Barrel Lengths were 28-30 inches in 10 or 12 gauge. 20" Barrels were not Common. Regarded as the Best American Shotgun Made.

Colt Model 1883 "Hammerless" Shotgun. Hammers were Internal. Some distrusted What They Could Not See and were Suspect of Safety Mechanism.

Double Barrel 12 Gauge with Extensive Repairs. Many Shotguns Received Rough Treatment.

Winchester Model 1887 Lever Action Shotgun. Winchester was Fond of Lever Actions like Colt was Fond of Revolving Cylinders. Loaded through the Action into Tubular Magazine Under Barrel. 10 or 12 Gauge Standard.





Winchester Model 1897 Pump Action Shotgun.

John Browning Design. Tried to Talk Winchester out of the Model 1887 and Introduce a Pump Instead. Won the Argument with the Model 1893 and Smokeless Version in 1897.
