Council President

The role of the Council President is to:

- ✓ Plan and preside over all regular and special meetings of the County 4-H Council.
- ✓ Serve as ex-officio member of all committees of the County 4-H Council and appoint the members of such committees.
- ✓ Call special meetings when necessary and in concurrence with the county 4-H Youth Development Program (YDP) staff.
- ✓ Prepare the Executive Committee and 4-H Council meeting agendas in consultation with the county 4-H YDP staff.
- ✓ Have signature authority on the 4-H Council checking and savings accounts.
- ✓ Have input into the yearly Budget Planning meetings along with the Treasurer.
- ✓ Oversee and collaborate with the Council Fundraising Committee.
- ✓ Have voting rights when a motion is on the floor and results in a tie vote.
- ✓ Appoint committees to conduct special work as needed.

Council Vice-President

The role of the Vice President is to:

- ✓ Preside at all meetings in the absence of the president.
- ✓ Succeed to the office of President should that office become vacant between elections.
- ✓ Serve as chairman on a yearly 4-H Council Program Committee. May be a point of contact and offer historical input and guidance.
- ✓ Have signature authority on the 4-H Council checking account and savings
- ✓ account.
- ✓ Have input into the yearly Budget Planning meetings.

Council Secretary

The role of the Secretary is to:

- ✓ Record the complete minutes of all meetings of the 4-H Council, and assist with any and all correspondence as directed by the President.
- ✓ Document motions made during the meeting and the results.
- ✓ Provide a copy of the 4-H Council minutes to county 4-H YDP staff following each Council meeting.
- ✓ Keep a record of those present at the 4-H Council meeting (units and other individuals).
- ✓ Have signature authority on the 4-H Council checking account and savings account.

Treasurer

The role of the treasurer is to:

- ✓ Keep accurate financial records, copies of invoices, bills, etc., relating to the funds and property of the 4-H Council and account fully for all receipts and expenditures.
- ✓ Receive, record and deposit all funds in a regulated bank or similar financial institution to the account established for the 4-H Council.
- ✓ Pay bills and make other authorized expenditures appropriated in the budget or otherwise approved by the 4-H Council.
- ✓ Secure authorization by the 4-H Council for disbursement of all funds.
- ✓ Comply with all University of Arizona financial policies and procedures as outlined in the 4-H YDP Policy Handbook.
- ✓ Initiate the yearly budget planning and presentation to membership.
- ✓ Furnish financial reports annually at year-end, and at such times as required by the 4-H Council and/or the county director. Financial reports include a balance sheet and an income statement.
- ✓ Act as custodian of all funds and personal property of the 4-H Council, and keep a current list of all such property.
- ✓ Prepare all financial records for an annual audit or peer review.
- ✓ Have signature authority on the 4-H Council checking and savings accounts.


- Exhibit Delivery Date: Wednesday, September 7, 9am 4pm

"Higher Orbits-Go For Launch" Camp by Stacy DeVeau



July 11-15 eleven Arizona 4-H teens joined 36 other 4-Hers from Indiana, Illinois, and Florida in Cape Canaveral, FL at the Kennedy Space Center for the "Higher Orbits-Go For Launch" camp, to compete to send an experiment to the International Space Station sometime next year. While in Florida, they collaborated in team



-building exercises and conducted research to develop and propose unique experiments to be conducted in space. They gained first-hand knowledge

and insight from Astronaut Jim (JR) Reilly who flew 3 space flight missions and conducted 5 spacewalks. They performed team challenges, designed their own mission patches, and learned from Higher Orbits staff about the importance of working together, using the engineering design process, and effective communication skills. They learned about the future of space exploration, gave presentations on their proposed experiments, and witnessed SpaceX launch the Dragon cargo mission to the International Space Station from the beach. The winning project will be launched to space in 2023! This will be the first time 4-H 'goes to space.' Arizona's Cove Searle (Navajo County) was on the winning 4-member team. The group also found time for visits to Kennedy Space Center's Visitor Complex and Cocoa Beach. The ISS National Laboratory - Center for the Advancement of Science in Space grant along with the Arizona 4-H Youth Foundation provided financial support for this amazing opportunity. Yavapai County's, Stacy DeVeau, 4-H Program Coordinator, and former NASA educator, chaperoned the trip, along with

Deb Martinez, a 4-H volunteer in Maricopa County. Dr. Jerry Lopez, led the multi-state initiative, called "4-H in Space: Mission Command

Team," for Arizona 4-H.

My JOLT Experience by Miriam Holyfield

I went on a journey this year. Not a far journey overseas and past the horizon, nor by plane or train. A dauntingly long journey, though hardly an hour's drive from my home in the rolling prairies, and at one time I was even able to see my hometown from a mountaintop. But I traveled so far, farther than I ever could have by land, sea or air. Within the mountains not for from my home I found one of the greatest opportunities, an open journey upon my doorstep. A journey that could change the course of my life and impact others, unlocking a wholly different future for tomorrow. A journey of growth and development, showing countless opportunities for all who would but reach out a willing hand.

But it was not just any journey, and I was not alone in it. There were others, some just like me and others very different. Obstacles were placed as traps before our feet, snares to entangle us, and we had to learn to trust, to leave everything we had in the hands of our teammates. Learning to work together rather then alone, we accomplished many things. Growing with Groundwater

Plants need water to grow, and it comes from precipitation and groundwater. We are going to build a miniature terrarium that will allow our plants to grow using groundwater as the source of water.

Time to plant!

Materials: Clear Jar with Lid

Gravel

Potting Soil
Spray Bottle Filled with Water

Plant Seeds (Herbs or Vegetables Grow Quickly)

Large Spoon or Trowel



- 1. Fill the bottom of your jar with 1 to 2 inches of gravel and add about 4 inches of potting soil on top of the gravel.
- 2. Plant the seeds as stated on the package.
- 3. Water generously with a spray bottle. Watch as the water trickles down through the soil and into the gravel layer. The water you see below the surface of the soil is called groundwater and will be used by the seeds.
- 4. Secure the lid and place in a sunny window. Over the next few days watch as the sides of the jar become foggy. This is condensation or clouds. As the water on the walls of the jar becomes heavy it will fall to the ground as rain and will become groundwater again.
- 5. If your jar becomes too foggy, open the lid slightly for a day or two. If you leave the lid off too long, the soil may dry out. If this happens just spray some more water in the jar.

6. Watch your seeds grow!
