RECAP OF 4-H ACTIVITIES


Yavapai County 4-H'ers went around the world during the stir fry cooking class at the Mountain Oak School in Prescott on Saturday, 11/19.

ANNOUNCEMENT

Colorado River Small Stock Show

As you may already know, the 2023 Colorado River Small Stock Show (CRSS) was cancelled . Aside from already existing logistical and financial impediments, the Governor's recent moratorium on live poultry exhibits put additional strains on this event. Our county is exploring alternative options for small stock, so please stay tuned! Read below for more information on avian influenza:

On November 23rd, Governor Ducey, in cooperation with the Arizona Department of Agriculture, implemented a temporary moratorium on live poultry exhibits in the state until further notice. Avian influenza affects all classes of poultry including chickens, ducks, turkeys, pheasant, quail, geese, and other species. Migratory waterfowl are the primary spreaders of the virus, however any species of wild bird may harbor and spread the infection while showing no signs of illness. What does this mean for 4-H in Yavapai County? Any in-person event involving birds from a different coop needs to be put on hold – including project meetings that require you to bring your poultry to another location. Let's keep our birds safe!

Protecting Your Backyard Flock

- Eliminate potential points of contact between wild and domestic birdsDo not feed wild birds on your property
- Exclude wild birds from your coop/run
- Remove other sources of food/water that encourage wild birds to congregate
- Free ranging flocks are most at risk
- Do not attend any poultry shows, exhibits, or swaps that include live birds
- Do not purchase poultry from unknown sources with unknown health history. Only purchase birds from National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) certified sources
- Quarantine any newly purchased birds, or birds that have traveled off premises
- Do not allow visitors to your flock, and do not visit other flocks
- Do not share equipment with other bird owners

FUNDRAISING

Fundraising for your new 4-H year

As our new 4-H year gets underway consider fundraising to cover expenses like membership fees, fair fees, 4-H Curriculum manuals, trip costs, community needs, and camping or other special events and activities that the club would like to include this year. These hands-on projects offer many benefits to members such as managing money, planning, setting goals, and working toward those goals. Below are some ideas for fundraising, as well as 4-H policies, resources, and places to start.

Starting...

- Start with seeking approval from the Yavapai County Youth Development Agent. You can access the application form here:

- All proposed fundraising activities must be also approved via an affirmative vote of membership (include in club minutes).

Fundraising Ideas:

- Ice Cream Social
- Grow and sell pumpkins/pumpkin festival
- Grow and sell produce at local farmers market (call the office if you need contacts)
- Community Dance
- Walk-a-thon
- Craft Fair
- Christmas Craft workshop
- Dessert Stand at Local event

- Petting Zoo
- Face painting
- Rummage Sale
- Cookbooks
- Holiday sales: fleece caps, candles, other crafts
- Dinners
- Babysitting
- Community Scavenger Hunts
- Rent-a-Kid

Tips

- When planning a fundraiser, always have a specific purpose in mind for using the funds being raised.
- The club should have proper identification so that donors can easily know who they are supporting.
- Proper organization and planning are essential to the success of any fundraiser.
- Always have a person in charge of collecting the money and someone in charge of overseeing the fundraiser.

FUNDRAISING...continued

Planning Worksheet Ideas (adapted from Purdue University 4-H)

- ✓ Brainstorm with members to identify fundraising ideas. Create a list.
- ✓ Let the youth decide what fundraiser they want to do. Take a vote!
- ✓ What is the "cause" for the fundraiser? Why is the club raising money?
- ✓ Review the idea(s) with your 4-H Youth Development Extension Educator. We want to make sure your fundraiser ideas meet the criteria for the 4-H program.
- ✓ Make a list of things that need to be done to have a successful fundraiser.
 - What is the timeframe for fundraiser?
 - What items will be sold, or services offered? (Geraniums, car wash, trash pick-up, fun show)
 - Who will help to organize the fundraiser? (Contact people for questions)
 - O How will advertising be conducted? (4-H newsletter, newspaper, radio, schools, etc.)
 - Which job assignments need to be made? (Money collector, door greeter, etc.)
 - O Where will the fundraiser be held?
 - O Who will be a part of the set-up crew?
 - Who will be a part of the clean-up crew? Will there be food provided in addition to the other activities? If so, who will coordinate the food stand and who will work the food stand?
 - What items are needed for the activity? (Trash bags, tickets, awards or prizes, etc.)
 - Are other organizations in the area holding fundraisers? For example, you do not want all the youth in the community selling candy bars at the same time!
 - Are there enough people to cover all jobs?
 - What is the method to collect all the money from the 4-H members and families of those who sold the candy bars or tickets?
 - Will you need start-up money (for making change or purchasing the items)? What is the source of these funds?
- ✓ Check around with others in your area or county to see if they have some helpful hints on organizing the fundraiser.

Advertising

Create a flyer. We have templates in the office that you can use for starting to design your flyer. Here are the items you need to include or consider for your flyer:

- Your 4-H club or group name
- Use the official 4-H Clover Logo (with the 18 USC 707 federal mark)
- UA Extension Logo
- Type of fundraiser you are holding (car wash, bake sale, etc.)
- Where it will take place (include complete address)
- When it will happen (dates and times)
- How will the funds be used; why are you raising money (be as specific as possible, including funds raised beyond the proposed budget)?
- Will the club be using the profits or proceeds of the fundraiser for advertised purpose?
- Does your fundraiser require payment of sales tax? If yes, is sales tax included in the price (e.g., food booth) or is there a fundraising vendor (e.g., candle company) responsible for paying it?
- Contact information (be cautious of listing contact information publicly, especially for youth).

FUNDRAISING...continued

Policies and considerations

Arizona 4-H specific guidelines for fundraising can be found on our website under Club Resources. In general, the guidelines below are consistent nationwide:

- Money raised in the name of 4-H must be used for 4-H purposes.
- 4-H fund raising should only be conducted to meet a 4-H club goal. There must be a definite plan to account for funds raised.
- Generally, money raised during the year should be spent that same year, so there is no need for a 4-H club to have a savings account. 4-H Clubs should have a checking account rather than a savings account.
- All moneys received from 4-H fund raising programs, except those necessary to pay reasonable expenses, must be spent to further the 4-H mission.
- Please check with the Extension staff before putting the 4-H name or 4-H Clover on any flyer or item you intend to sell for profit.
- Under no circumstances may the 4-H Name or Emblem be used for fundraising purposes in any games of chance including bingo and raffles.

SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITY

DORRANCE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS

Providing academic and financial support to Arizona's first-generation college students

The Dorrance Scholarship is a need-based award that aims to instill college-going traditions in future generations of Arizona families, to provide financial access and academic support for recipients, and to enhance college persistence through unique enrichment experiences.



Paying for College

The **program** includes a \$12,000 scholarship per academic year for four years. The total program is valued at over \$100,000.



Succeeding Academically

Recipients attend an **Orientation** and a **Summer Bridge** experience to prepare for college academics. A dedicated **advisor** meets with students regularly and **tutoring** is available when needed.



Building Camaraderie

International **travel**, an **innovation**experience, and cultural **enrichment**events are designed to help round
out the college experience.

The event will span June 18-23, 2023, with exact travel dates to be determined.




