Did you know.....

Educational and Youth Development Principles of a 4-H Club:

- → Uses experiential learning learning by doing as a primary teaching approach.
- Must provide the <u>Eight Critical Elements</u> of positive 4-H Youth Development
- → Includes planned opportunities to learn and apply life skills such as leadership, citizenship, community service and public speaking.
- → Provides individual project experiences to develop in-depth knowledge about science, engineering and technology; citizenship; and healthy living and other topics.
- → Provides programs, curricula, and procedures that are based in research and are developmentally appropriate.
- → Provides members and volunteers access to resources of land-grant universities and to county, state and national 4-H opportunities.
- → Fosters youth-adult partnerships that encourage active involvement and participating by youth and adults.
- → Offers projects in a wide range of subject matter areas relevant to the Land Grant University knowledge base to meet youth needs and interests.
- **4-H Project:** A 4-H Project is a planned sequence of age appropriate and research-based learning opportunities. As a result of long-term active engagement in the project, the youth gains knowledge and develops skills based on planned goals and identified outcomes. 4-H project work is guided by trained adults who help youth set goals and provide access to appropriate curricula and resources.

Leaders and Parents of Cloverbud Members:

As a reminder, Cloverbuds are encouraged to submit Indoor Exhibits at the Yavapai County 4-H/FFA EXPO such as posters or demonstrations. Entry registration is due August 4th (see Premium Book for details). To help guide you, we have included a few excerpts from the 2018 Arizona 4-H Policy & Procedure Handbook:

- **3.2** Cloverbuds is the ONLY project in which children 4-H ages 5-8 can be enrolled. Cloverbuds explore through small groups various learning experiences. Youth within this age are not yet ready for competition. Curriculum has specifically been selected to allow Cloverbuds to be involved in activities and learning experiences that are developmentally appropriate and **non-competitive**.
- **14.2** Competitive activities are not developmentally appropriate for children of this age range and are strictly prohibited
- **12.5** Participation is encouraged in other organizational activities such as Arizona Nationals and Arizona State Fair. However, it is not appropriate to identify other organizational activities as 4-H.

Grow Tomato Seeds... from Space!



Over the past 12 years, an education project called Tomatosphere has flown tomato seeds to space, where they've spent time onboard the International Space Station (ISS) before being returned to Earth and distributed to youth to plant along with seeds that remained Earthbound.

This year's seeds were taken to the ISS onboard the SpaceX CRS-11 Dragon last summer and spent four weeks on the ISS!

The Extension Office has received some of these seeds for 4-H youth to grow. If your club, project or members is/are interested in participating in this experiment, you can receive two packets of seeds. One packet has been in space; the other is a control group that is exactly the same type as the space seeds ... except that they have NOT been in space. Also available are planting recommendations and tips.

If you participate, you will be asked to submit your group's results to the Extension Office following the germination period. We will submit the cumulative results for the seeds to the Tomotosphere Project Team by 1/15/19.

Through this project, students learn how to conduct a scientific experiment and compare the germination rates of the two groups of seeds.

Let's Get Outdoors: Scavenger Hunt!

Goals of this lesson:

Youth will:

- Have the opportunity to get outside.
- Work together as a team.
- · Accomplish a Goal.



What You Need to Know:

The first step in learning how to create a scavenger hunt for your Cloverbuds is to decide on what type of hunt you want to do. Scavenger hunts can be lots of fun, but they can also be educational and creative. You can tailor them to fit the needs of any camp. That means you can teach your kids life lessons through scavenger hunts or you can just have fun with them!

Materials Needed:

- Friends

Learning Activity:

- 1. Look at the list of outdoor objects on the data sheet. Our goal for this hunt is to find as many of those items as you can.
- 2. Decide with the other players if you will each hunt alone or if you will form teams. Also, agree on times to start and end the hunt.
- 3. As you find an object, put it in a bag or cup, and check it off your data sheet.
- 4. Return any living objects to the outdoors. Use some of the others to create a collage, pictures, or creature.
