Record Book - My 4-H Story

It's time to think about how you will tell your own unique 4-H story for your record book. I've included some ideas generated by our Yavapai County 4-H Staff team, discovered on the internet, and shared by 4-H Agents from other Arizona Counties. Have fun exploring these options and developing your own.

Standard suggestions to consider: Introduce yourself. Share about your interests, family, hobbies etc. If you were given two minutes to tell someone about yourself, what would you say? Describe how 4-H has made a difference in your life. How did the project you are completing in this Project Record help you grow? Who has helped you in your 4-H journey? How has your 4-H participation helped others? What are your goals in life? Include activities outside of 4-H.

Writing Prompts:

"Because of 4-H, I was able to ..."

Other creative ideas:

- 1. Write about 4-5 4-H Life Skills you've gained during the 4-H year SEE CHART BELOW
- 2. Pretend you were walking on a beach when you find a magic bottle. Now you have 3 wishes for 4-H. What would they be and why? For your club, for yourself, future. How are your wishes connected to your projects, community service, etc.

We are trying to establish the degree of interest in launching a Yavapai County 4-H Horse program. If you have the skills and interest in being a project leader, or you are a 4-H member with an interest in ALL things Horse, please let the office know so we can support the development of this program. We have some supplies, loads of curriculum, and a sincere interest in reaching the needs of our youth. Please call or email Claire Oberst.

Calling all current and in-process volunteers and senior members* interested in becoming shooting sports certified instructor...

Registration for Level-1 Shooting Sports Instructor Training and Certification is now open in ZSuite: July 14-16 at James 4-H Camp. Volunteers will be eligible for reimbursement of half of the registration fee if they become certified and lead a shooting sports project during the 2023-2024 4-H year.

Summer 2023 Level-1 Instructor Training

Update: Z-Suite registration is now open!

Who: 4-H adult volunteer and senior 4-H youth members seeking qualification to lead shooting sports projects at the club and county level. No previous shooting sports experience is necessary except for the Western Heritage discipline.

What: Discipline qualifications being offered include: Archery, Pistol, Rifle, Hunting Skills / Outdoor Exploration, Muzzleloading, and Western Heritage. Student instructors can choose two of the above disciplines (based on scheduling availability) except Western Heritage* as this is a two-day course and thus will consume the entire weekend. Students will select one discipline from Block A and one discipline from Block B below. *Be aware that Western Heritage requires all students to previously hold a Level-1, 4-H shooting sports instructor certification (preferably rifle, pistol, or shotgun) due to the complexity of the discipline. Anyone who does not meet this qualification must be interviewed by the state shooting sports coordinator before being admitted into the class.

Block A Disciplines: Archery, Muzzleloader, Rifle, Western Heritage

Block B Disciplines: Hunting Skills / Outdoor Exploration, Pistol, Western Heritage

When: 14-16 July 2023. Check-in begins at 4:00 pm Friday, 14 July 2023. Instruction will end at approximately 2:30 pm on Sunday, 16 July 2023. Note: Our next Level-1 shooting sports instructor training opportunity after this one will be in the winter of 2023/2024 (November, December, or January).

Summer 2023 Level-1 Instructor Training...*continued*

Why: Because what could be better than a weekend in the high country, away from the heat, spent learning about shooting sports instruction and its ability to create positive youth development for Arizona 4-H members!

Equipment Needed: Please bring the following items with you: water source, eye protection, hearing protection (not required for archery discipline), hat, closed-toe shoes, pants, jacket for morning and evening instruction, sunscreen, bug spray, medications as needed, sleeping bag, pillow, writing utensils, folding chair, shower shoes, toiletries, towel, change of clothes as desired for the weekend.

Registration fees and breakdowns:

Training in two disciplines (or Western Heritage), including all meals (Friday dinner through Sunday lunch) and lodging (Friday through checkout on Sunday): \$225

Coursework (Discipline Book/Binder) fees, in addition to registration fees.

- Option 1: Coursework download sent to your email and needs to be brought to training on a personal device of your own (FREE)
- Option 2: Coursework downloaded on a tablet provided at the event that you get to take home (\$75)
- Option 3: Coursework printed and tabbed in a hard-side binder provided at the event (\$85)

Registrations must be completed in Z-Suite no later than 15 June 2023. Late registrations will be accepted with a \$75 late fee and only with a free course download option.

Cancellations: Registration fees, minus a \$50.00 processing fee, will be refunded to enrollees if a cancellation notice is received before 01 July 2023. Fees cannot be refunded for cancellations received after 07 July 2023.

Certification information: Participants will be able to certify in two disciplines over the weekend except for Western Heritage which is a two-day course. Course applicants will be asked to list their top three discipline choices during the Z-suite application process.

To be eligible to participate, you must be a Certified 4-H Leader or have started the process with your local county 4-H staff. (Note: Training certificates will be withheld until adult certified volunteer status is confirmed by your county coordinator/agent for those whose certification process is not complete by the end of training on 16 July 2023.)

Schedule:

Friday, 14 July- Participants arrive at James 4-H Camp at 1600/4 pm for check-in, dinner, and AZ 4-H specific shooting sports policy review instruction. Late arrivals can complete this part of the training virtually, if needed, with prior coordination with the State Shooting Sports Coordinator.


Saturday, 15 July - Breakfast at 7:00 am, break into disciplines for morning training. Lunch at noon. Break into disciplines for final practice and teaching practicums. Dinner at 5:00 pm followed by a special STEM lesson and discipline #2 training.

Sunday, 16 July - Breakfast at 7:00 am, followed by discipline #2 training. Lunch @ 11:00 am. Break into disciplines for final practice, and teaching practicums. Certificates will be awarded at 2:00 pm. Training will be completed by 2:30 pm.

PLEASE DO NOT BRING ANY FIREARMS OR ARCHERY EQUIPMENT WITH YOU TO TRAINING UNLESS YOU HAVE MADE PREVIOUS ARRANGEMENTS WITH THE STATE SHOOTING SPORTS COORDINATOR (ERIK SCHROEDER, 602 730 4066).

Hello Yavapai County 4-H,

Thank you so much for your support of the rodeo parade! As the chairman of the Prescott Frontier Days® Rodeo Parade, I am pleased to announce our 2023 Rodeo Parade scheduled for Saturday, July 1st, 2023. Our Parade Theme this year is "**Dances With Bulls**".

We would like to take this time to invite you to participate by helping the parade committee with our staging horse clean-up, also known as the "Manure Clean-Up Crew". This would be a paying position to your group of \$400.00.

We need 5 to 10 kids and adults who would be responsible for manure cleanup around the parade staging area where horse groups are located. We need to make sure that any business in the staging areas are clear of all manure as well. You may bring a small UTV or "gator" to assist in clean-up containment. The parade will begin at 9 am, but we would need your group as early as 8:00 am to check in and get situated since many parade participants arrive very early. The job will be completed after all parade equine participants have left the staging area and all the streets and business locations in the vicinity are clear of manure. We will also provide water, Gatorade, and breakfast sandwiches to the group.

I have attached our Parade Participation Application & Waiver Form, if you are able to participate, please complete the forms and return them to us when possible. We will also need to collect waivers from all of the participants in your group and they can be turned in all the way up to the day of the parade. We will also work closely with the rodeo office to have the payment sent out promptly.

Please let me know if you have any questions or need additional information, my contact information is noted below, and am available when convenient for you. We look forward to seeing you for our 136th World's Oldest Rodeo & Parade.

Beautiful Butterflies

Have you ever wondered how a butterfly fluttered?


Butterflies flap their wings by contracting the thorax (the body

part where the legs and wings are attached).

Let's build a model to see how it works!

Cardboard Toilet Paper Tube Materials:

Index Card Scissors Clear Tape Markers



Procedure:

- 1. Make 2 longitudinal cuts along the toilet paper tube. Cut the tube so there are two parts - one larger and one smaller.
- 2. Cut an index card in half and tape each half to an edge of the larger portion of the tube. Leave about $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch overhang towards the middle of the tube.
- 3. Tape the edges of the smaller portion of the tube to the inner edges of the cards. Hold the tube (the thorax) with the smaller part of the tube on the top.
- 4. While holding the bottom tube section (the larger one), press down and then release the upper section. The index card "wings" will begin to flap up and down.
- 5. Decorate your butterfly!
