RE: Arizona Detections of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) & Poultry Exhibits

Dear poultry producers, exhibitors, and livestock market operators selling poultry or other avian,

Over the course of the last 12 months, the United States has been dealing with both the largest HPAI outbreak on record, and the largest outbreak of animal disease ever recorded. To date, there have been countless wildlife detections in a variety of species. In domestic poultry, 47 states have had positive detections that have affected 58 million birds.

Arizona's first case of HPAI in domestic poultry was identified on November 4th, 2022 followed shortly after with a second detection.


It has been exactly 90 days since the last detection of HPAI in domestic species in Arizona. While neighboring states continue to have detections and we continue to investigate suspicious cases of illness and conduct surveillance, no further cases have been identified to date in Arizona.

Though the statewide poultry movement hold order is being rescinded, we remind everyone to remain vigilant in watching for signs of widespread illness in your poultry including respiratory disease, neurologic signs, or rapid deterioration and death and to report those to us as soon as possible. Also please be very cognizant of biosecurity principles and take appropriate precautions. We hope that the trending pattern continues and that the HPAI risk associated with migratory waterfowl diminishes in the next few months with northerly migration and increasing ambient temperatures.

On behalf of the Arizona Department of Agriculture I would like to personally thank you for your understanding surrounding the circumstances in implementing these extraordinary measures.

Sink or Float?



Science

Does it float? Try different objects and record if they sink or float.

Materials: Sponge

> Paper Clip Toothpick Marble

Plastic Spoon

Penny

Plastic Straw

Crayon

Plastic Dishpan or Bucket, filled with water

Towel

Piece of Paper

Pencil

Procedure:

- 1. Divide your piece of paper into two. On one side write FLOAT and on the other write SINK.
- 2. Make predictions of which objects you think will sink and which will float.
- 3. Time for testing! With the container filled with water, place each object in it one at a time and record whether the object floats or sinks.

Which items did you guess correctly?	
Why do you think some items sink and some float?
