URGENT INFORMATION....Members, Leaders, Teachers, Parents, please read.

Several show lambs and members that have been on the "Show Circuit" have been infected with Club Lamb Fungus or Ringworm (Lumpy Wool, Woolrot). Ringworm is caused by a fungus in the *Trichophyton* genus. It can be spread by direct lamb-to-lamb contact or through contact with infected equipment or surroundings. The fungus can live in the environment for several years.

It is a highly contagious disease and is contagious to humans. The condition is zoonotic, humans and other

species (cattle, pigs, dogs, cats, rabbits, cavy, etc.) can be infected from contact with the fungus on the sheep. These infections occur by entry of the fungus through the skin. Scarring of skin from infected areas has been reported in humans. Be sure to inform the physician the skin condition has possibly been acquired from sheep and that it may be a particularly contagious form of fungal disease.



Disease Identification is important. Inspect your animals daily, **if you suspect Ringworm contact your leader** and take biosecurity actions by isolating the suspected animal away from others and pets. **Any animal with active ringworm will not be allowed to attend any weight-ins, clinics, shows or the County Fair.**

Prevention is the key to reducing the risk of contracting club lamb fungus. One of the best management practices is to use a disinfectant product that contains Chlorhexidine. This is a safe product, available at most farm supply stores, for youth to use on equipment and pens. Some formulations can be used directly on lambs. Spray pens at the show with a disinfectant solution before putting animals in the pen. Keep blankets on sheep at the show to minimize skin exposure. Avoid sharing equipment with other exhibitors, especially electric clippers. After showing, rinse the lamb with a Chlorhexidine solution or use other commercially available products approved for use on sheep before mixing with others at home. Also remember to disinfect the equipment following the show.

Personal hygiene is also important to consider. Wash your hands before handling your own sheep at a show if you have been in contact with sheep that are not yours. After the show, monitor your lambs at home for two weeks in a separate pen away from other sheep to reduce risk of introducing club lamb fungus and other diseases to the whole flock, yourself and other pets.





Let's Get Outdoors: Scavenger Hunt!

Goals of this lesson:

Youth will:

What You Need to Know:
