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J.O.L.T. 2019 Youth and Adult CODE OF CONDUCT



The mission of Arizona 4-H Youth Development is to provide a variety of educational opportunities which will assist youth to become capable and contributing members of our global society. In fulfilling this mission, certain standards of behavior are expected of all participants and is also necessary to provide a positive learning environment for others. The following guidelines represent the

Arizona 4-H Youth Development Youth and Adult CODE OF CONDUCT:

- Work cooperatively with other 4-H participants, youth, volunteer leaders, families, Cooperative Extension faculty and staff, and others in a courteous, respectful manner.
- Know and obey the local laws as well as the laws of the state and federal government.
- Any person, adult or youth, while participating in 4-H activities, also agrees to refrain from the use of any tobacco, alcohol, and illegal drugs/substances and weapons at all 4-H events and while transporting youth to and from events.
- Present appropriate model in dress, manners, conduct, appearance, language, and actions during all 4-H events. (See Dress Code)
- 5. Use respect and care for all property used. Charges will be assessed for any misuse or damage.
- 6. Attend and participate in all planned events.
- Know and follow established rules before event begins such as program, hours, curfew, room guidelines, etc.
- Represent the Arizona 4-H Youth Development Program with pride and dignity.
- 9. Disciplinary process: An Adult & Youth Behavior Review Committee will be formed, composed of youth and adult participants, Extension Agents and Staff to consider the inappropriate behavior and take appropriate actions. Failure to abide by established rules could result in a trip home at the expense of the parent or guardian and /or loss of eligibility to participate in future 4-H Youth Development events and activities.
- Before I depart on the last day I agree to be checked out of my room by a J.O.L.T. adult staff.

Those who find themselves unable to conduct themselves with in the guidelines listed may expect:

- 1. To explain their actions to those in charge
- 2. To accept the consequences of their actions
- 3. To have those in charge monitor their behavior, and that remedies are implemented, such as payment for damages, dismissal from event, curfew restriction, etc.

2019 J.O.L.T. Involvement Committee Descriptions

Involvement Committees are groups that help plan and conduct special parts of the J.O.L.T. Leadership experience. Campers learn and demonstrate leadership skills using the "experiential learning model" and the 4-H slogan - "Learn by Doing". Each camper (youth and adults) are requested to select their 1st, 2nd and 3rd choice.

Recreational Leadership: If you have a lot of positive energy, this is the involvement committee for you. Committee members learn, adapt, organize & teach recreational programming that highlights an assortment of new leadership exercises and activities (Highly active and requires aptitude for fun, flexibility and teaching!).

A Healthier You: Teens face many obstacles in life today; creating a "healthier you" will prepare you for success. This IC will lead the camp in morning energizers that get your blood pumping and prepares you for the day. It will also help youth learn the importance of eating healthy and adapting a better lifestyle for a stronger mind and body (Zumba lovers, healthy snackers, and teens interested in a better you, join here!).

Community Service: Do you enjoy helping others? This involvement committee promotes community outreach through community service projects. Be involved in actions that will create positive change and build the community. Throughout the week, you will develop projects that will be presented as camp wide community service projects. This rewarding experience will allow you to develop ideas for projects to bring back to your organizations (Caring individuals, people who want to make a difference in the world and the community in which they live... we have a spot for you!).

S.T.E.M.: Campers will work as a team to explore the opportunities and mysteries of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math. This IC will lead campers on a journey of discovery through experimentation, innovation, construction, and calculation to solve problems that are facing the world today (Engineers, scientists, and participants interested in hands on learning are needed here!).

Improv: Improvisation is spontaneous performance. In this IC, we will learn skills that help you think on your feet and react quickly to changing circumstances. Water Dissolves Things

- Give each child a food item (salt, sugar cubes, powdered sugar, honey or syrup, flour, uncooked beans, cooking oil, butter or shortening, uncooked rice), and ask him/ her to tell you what it is.
- Then give each child a plastic cup, a spoon and a straw.
- Have the children pour some water in their
- Then tell them to use the plastic spoons to add some of their food to their glass of water and then stir with the straws.
- Ask what happens when they do this.

Cork Sailboats

- The day before the meeting, cut white paper into 2 inch squares, then cut each of the squares in half diagonally to make the sails.
- Ask the children if they have noticed that some things float in water. Ask them to think of things they have seen floating at
- Tell them that they are going to make something that will float on water a
- Put out crayons and colored pencils and give each child one of the triangular pieces
- Have them write their name on the sails and decorate it as they like.
- Give each child a cork and have them choose a colored toothpick for the mast.
- Have them insert the toothpick through the sail. Then have them stick the toothpick into the middle of their cork.
- After the children finish their boats, have them put the boats in the large basin of water to see if they float.

Outside Water Fun

- Have each child bring a swimsuit and towel to the meeting.
- Spread a sheet of plastic on level grassy ground. Stake it down and spray it with
- Have the children take turns running and sliding down the plastic sheet.
- Talk about how the water spreads out on the plastic after it flows out of the hose.
- Take garden hoses and show the children how the water flows out of the hose. Point out to the children that the water spreads out on the ground and doesn't stay in one shape.
