#### IMPORTANT LINKS

All 4-H members are required to meet the following minimum standards each year. If the requirements are not met, then the member will be unable to participate in the 4-H show and sale the following year. Each club has the option of adding requirements to this list. If a club does add requirements they must notify their members in writing by the first 4-H meeting of the year.

A copy of the club's bylaws must be on record at the Cooperative Extension Office.

- 1. Adhere to the expectations of the Arizona 4-H Code of Conduct.
- 2. Attend Community Club Meetings, Project Meetings and/or activities in compliance with Community Club's attendance policy. \* A minimum of 6 meetings must be held per year, per club, per project. IE: Community Club must meet at least 6 times. Lamb project meeting must meet at least 6 times.
- 3. Participate in at least ONE 4-H Community service event. \* Please see definitions of community service.
- 4. Complete a 4-H project doing one's own work with <u>minimal assistance</u> from parents or others. If a youth requires accommodations the Received Help Form is recommended.
- 5. Give a club or county 4-H public presentation for each project enrolled in.
- 6. Participate in 3 recognized 4-H events throughout the year (local, county, state or national level). **Examples:** livestock judging (local/club level), MoYava 4-H Camp (state level), National 4-H Congress (national level), or 4-H/FFA EXPO or 4-H Horse Show (county level). Club and project meetings are not a part of the 3 recognized events.
- 7. Complete a 4-H record book and turn it in to your community club leader.


## New Mexico 4-H Cloverbud Project Activities

### Stomp, Blow and Splash: Soil, Air and Water Rain Gauge



#### What You Will Need:

- a clear plastic soda bottle
- a pair of scissors
- a permanent marker with a sharp point
- small stones or aquarium gravel
- water
- ruler



- 2. Fill the curved part of the bottom of the bottle with small stones or aquarium gravel. This will weight your rain gauge to keep it from falling over.
- 3. Pour enough water into the bottle to cover the stones. Use the marker to draw a line at the top surface of the water.
- 4. Mark a "0" next to the line. This is your baseline.
- 5. Use the ruler and marker to measure 1", 2", and 3" up the bottle from the baseline. Draw a line at each inch mark and label the lines. (Tip: you may want to empty the water out of the bottle before doing this, so you can lay the bottle on its side to measure.)
- 6. Use the ruler and marker to measure and mark ½", 1 ½", and 2 ½".
- 7. If you want to make your rain gauge more accurate, use the ruler and marker to measure and mark 1/4", 3/4", 1 1/4", 1 3/4", etc. on the bottle
- 8. Wait for rain!
- 9. When the weather forecast predicts rain, or rain starts falling, add water to your rain gauge up to the baseline.
- 10. Put the rain gauge outside to catch the rainwater.
- 11. When the rain stops, check to see how many inches of rain fell into vour rain gauge!

You may want to make a chart to keep track of how much rain falls in a week or a month. On the chart, list the date it rained and how many inches of rain fell. Add up the rainfall at the end of the week or month.

Important! Be sure the rain gauge is filled to the baseline before you begin collecting.

## Parts from Poll to Pastern


If a showmanship judge asked you to point to your goat's thurl, could you do it? How about its chine? There are many good reasons to learn the names of a goat's body parts. This activity will help you do just that and have fun along the way.

Dairy Goat Skill:	Identifying goat body parts
Life Skill:	Reasoning
Education Standard:	NS.K-4.3: Life Science: Organisms and environments
Success Indicator:	Correctly identifies goat body parts.

## Goat to it!

Label each word in the Word Bank with the number of the line that points to the correct body part. See the example for "eye." It may take you several years to learn all these parts. Do the best you can now.

For more fun, get an unlabeled goat parts diagram from your 4-H office or draw a large outline of a goat. Put it up on a wall. Write each Word Bank part on a separate piece of paper and put them all in a bowl. With a group of friends, take turns drawing a piece of paper from the bowl and showing where that goat body part is found on the goat diagram on the wall. If you can, name and point to goat body parts on a real live goat.

#### Browse For More (Apply what you learned)


- How will you use what you learned about goat body parts?


