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NEW 4-H YEAR ENROLLMENT

It is that time of year again to re-enroll in the Yavapai County 4-H Youth Development Program. You may enroll for the 2017/2018 year after August 15th by using this link https://az.4honline.com. 4-H Online is based on "zero-based enrollment." This means that each year at the start of the enrollment cycle membership in Arizona 4-H goes to zero and everyone must re-enroll. At that time, your profile will show as "inactive", this is for the 2017/18 year only. This process is based on federal accounting policies. The new year officially starts on October 1st.

Returning Members: Use your e-mail and password to access your established profile. If you have forgotten your e-mail, contact your county Extension Office or select "I forgot my password." **DO NOT CREATE A NEW PROFILE!** Click on the "Edit" button on the right side of the inactive member's profile listing. Review and update all information pertaining to your profile. CHECK IT OUT -Incorrect information will affect your ability to register for events, access proper enrollment fees, communication, etc. Once all profile information is current and correct under the Personal Information, Additional Information, Health Form, and Participation areas of enrollment continue to the Invoice page. Review your invoice to ensure that the program development fee has been charged and it is correct. Once information has been reviewed, click continue to the Payment screen. Select the appropriate method of payment by clicking on the correct button, then click "Select Payment Method." The only option we accept is the county/club check. You will be sent to the Confirm page. Confirm your participation fee by clicking the "Confirm Order." Your pending enrollment will then be sent to the county office for review and acceptance. When the county Extension Office receives your enrollment notice and fee from your Community Club leader, they will review all information and approve your membership.

As a reminder, youth will be eligible to use curriculum and participate in club meetings, workshops and day camps, etc. However, selected events, such as the county fair, and certain project areas may have specific enrollment deadlines for participation. These deadlines must be met for participation. August 15 Open Enrollment for Youth begins (not available until your Club Leader enrolls)

November 1 Lovesome Valley Wranglers re-enrollment ends for return members

November 30 Chino Valley Breakaway Latigos re-enrollment ends for returning members

February 1 4honline enrollment & fees paid to show any animal at 4-H/FFA EXPO (Market & Breeding)

February 1 Last day to take Horse Helmet Safety Training module in 4honline (one time only for Horse

Members)

May 15 Last day to enroll to meet Member in Good Standing Requirements
May 15 Last day to enroll - fees paid for Dog Projects and Indoor Exhibits

May 15 Last day to make project selections (to update 4honline) thru Club Leader only

Be sure to visit with your <u>Club Leader</u> if you have any concerns or questions. They are the ones who need to sign off that you are a member in good standing within a project.





Bubble Mania: The Un-Poppable Bubble

Goals of this lesson:

Youth will:

- Create their own wand and solution to make bubbles.
- Learn why giving liquid edges to scissors create a barrier that will allow them to become a part of the bubble.
- Observe bubble movement, shape, and color.

What You Need to Know:

Time and Time again, science has shown us that first impressions can't be trusted. Consider the bubble: At first glance, it looks like the most fragile thing in the world. Yet under the right circumstances, it can be surprising difficult if not impossible to burst.

Materials Needed:

- 8 1/2 x 11 inch sheet of card stock
- Tape
- Scissors with Adult Supervision and Assistants
- Bowl and spoon
- 1 cup plus 2 tablespoons water
- 2 tablespoons dishwashing liquid
- 2 tablespoons glycerin
- Plastic drinking straw

Learning Activity:

- 1. Create a cone shape out of your sheet of card stock. (using tape)
- 2. Create a bubble mixture by mixing together your water, dishwashing soap, and glycerin.
- 3. Dip the wide end of the cone into the bubble solution and hold it there for a few seconds to absorb the mixture. Tap off the excess liquid and then quickly dip the cone again. With the cone pointed toward the ground, gently blow a large bubble. Leave it attached to the end of the cone using our finger to cover the cone's tip.
- 4. Now stick the point of the scissors into the bubble. It should pop instantly. Try again, but this time first dip the scissors points into the bubble solution. They should pass right through the bubble's "delicate" skin without it breaking.

There are 2 main ways a bubble pops. The first is when it's watery wall evaporates (adding some glycerin to the bubble solution slows down this process). The second is when something dry tears a hole in the wall, as when you poke it with the bare points of a pair of scissors. Dipping the blades into the bubble solution beforehand however, gives them liquid edges, and the bubble wall simply flows around them.
