
Statewide Virtual Events!

This year we have a new 4-H Management System called Zingbooks. All youth and volunteers must be registered in Zingbooks to participate in 4-H. This system allows for online payment. Remember that the 4-H year is October 1 through September 30. Zingbooks has areas for project registration, sharing documents online, a web-based record book, club, county, and state calendars, announcements, and more! Also, make sure that email addresses and other contact information are up to date to ensure effective communication.

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
