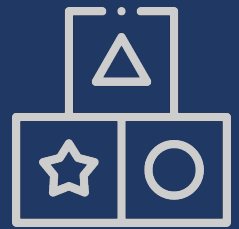

Participants identified what they found most useful about the workshop.

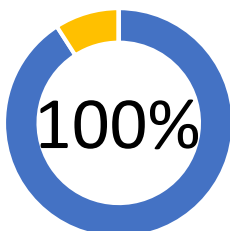
“ All of the different books that were presented. I was not aware of some of the books. ”

“ Just feeling comfortable being indigenous. Its great to see that there is a native influence in language and literacy that we can all relate to. ”

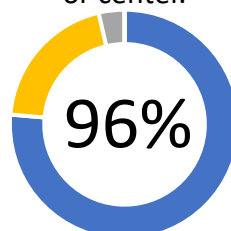
“ Learning how to share and celebrate native stories with the children in my classroom. ”

Most participants felt that the workshop was **very** or **extremely valuable** for learning about:

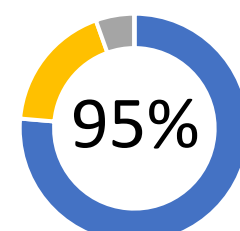
Children's books written by native authors or celebrating native people and cultures.



How to use children's books by native authors or celebrating native people and cultures with young children in their classroom or center.



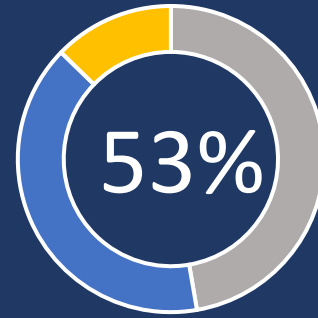
How to use oral storytelling in their classroom or center with young children.



All participants said that the information learned from the workshop would be useful in their work **sometimes** or **often**.

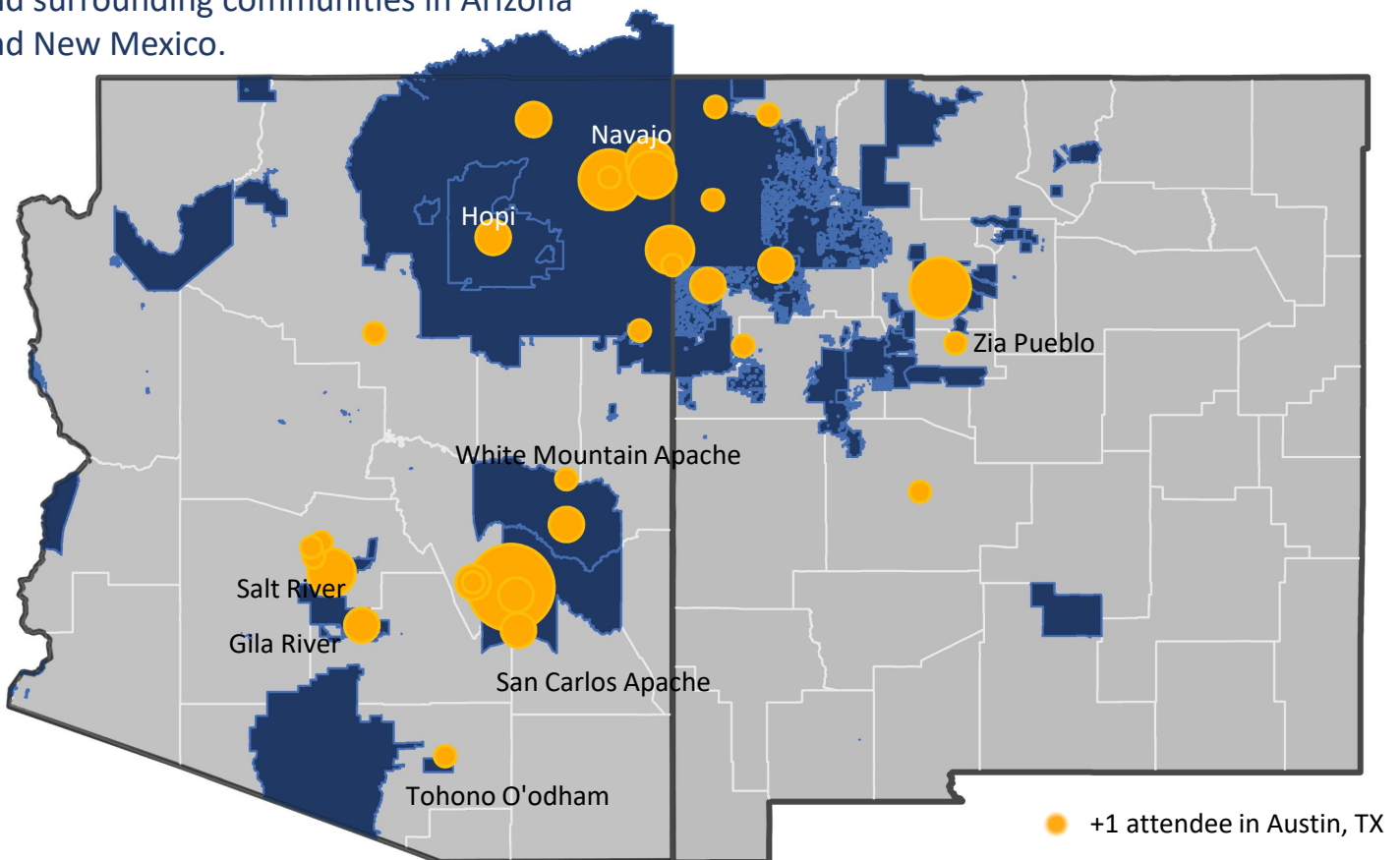


Over half of participants indicated that it would be **hard** or **very hard** to learn about the topics covered during this workshop from another source.
