## **Five Ways That Children Learn**

1	TALKING	<ul> <li>Talking with children is important. It helps them learn:</li> <li>New words and sounds.</li> <li>About the world around them.</li> <li>How to have conversation with adults and other children.</li> <li>About their history and culture.</li> <li>About new ideas and how to make connections between ideas.</li> </ul>
2	READING	<ul> <li>Reading to children is important:</li> <li>It enhances children's listening skills and language development.</li> <li>It provides opportunities to learn new vocabulary words and concepts.</li> <li>It helps children learn to love books and encourages them to become life-long learners.</li> </ul>
3	WRITING	<ul> <li>Writing with children is important:</li> <li>Writing and reading support each other.</li> <li>Children learn the connection between letters, sounds, and words by hearing them, seeing them and writing them.</li> </ul>
4	SINGING	<ul> <li>Singing with children is important:</li> <li>Singing sends endorphins flowing to the brain. This causes the body to feel good and increases the brain's activity.</li> <li>It helps children: <ul> <li>Concentrate on a task.</li> <li>Learn sounds and words.</li> <li>Remember words and concepts.</li> <li>Develop their imaginations and creativity.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
5	PLAYING	<ul> <li>Playing with children is important:</li> <li>Play helps children understand how the world works.</li> <li>Children gain literacy skills through play; especially when they play with books, letter blocks, and writing materials.</li> <li>Imaginary and dramatic play help children learn about themselves and the world around them.</li> <li>Children incorporate the skills and knowledge gained during play into their everyday lives.</li> </ul>
